

# **Current Trends and Existing Conditions**

#### **Native Americans in California**

- Dispossession and loss of land
- 110 federally-recognized tribes with many others seeking recognition
- More than 1.4 million American Indian and Alaska Native peoples living in California
- The majority Native peoples live off tribal land in city and county jurisdictions
- At least 5x more likely to experience homelessness



## **Barriers to Housing for Tribal Communities**

- When and where fair housing laws apply
- For tribes, access to funds and capital, administrative capacity, economic development challenges, and the complexity of building on tribal land
- Insufficient support for Native peoples living off tribal land
- Limitations in targeting services to Native populations off tribal land
- Intersection of higher rates of poverty and homelessness for Native peoples
