THE CDBG-R SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENT

Jurisdiction(s): State of California

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Overview

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (Department) requests to amend, upon HUD approval, the state of California 2008-2009 Annual Action Plan as allowed per the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), Public Law 111-5. Title XII of Division A of ARRA appropriates \$1 billion in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to states and local governments to carry out, on an expedited basis, eligible activities under the CDBG Program. The grant program under Title XII is commonly referred to as the CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) program.

The Department requests the full \$10,652,033 made available though the CDBG-R allocation formula process. The Department will set aside from the total award (less an amount retained for administration costs) 30 percent for economic development activities. The remaining balance will be considered a general allocation to fund a variety of CDBG-R eligible activities.

Per HUD guidelines, the grantee may utilize up to 10 percent of the overall funds for general administrative costs. For states, the 10 percent maximum applies to the state and all entities it funds. All eligible applicants, who are awarded CDBG-R funds by the state, will be allowed up to three percent of their allocation amount for general administration costs. The remaining balance will be retained by the state to administer the program.

Allocation

Economic Development

The Economic Development set aside has been used to fund 2009/2010 Economic Development applicants who have already submitted applications to the Department and whose projects met the CDBG-R Program criteria. The maximum grant amount for this set-aside allocation is \$2.5 million. All Economic Development activities funded will benefit low and moderate income persons.

General

The General Allocation has been used to fund CDBG eligible projects that fell below the funding threshold of the 2008/2009 CDBG General Allocation distribution process, and which met the ARRA objectives of stimulating the economy through measures that modernize

infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and/or expand educational opportunities and access to health care. All activities funded with the General Allocation will benefit low and moderate income persons. The Department has established the following thresholds in selecting projects from unfunded 2008 applications for CDBG-R funding:

- The projects must have been assigned a readiness score equal to or greater than 30 out of the maximum 50 points allowed per Title 25 CCR, Section 7078.5(b) (during the 2008 ranking process) and be able to demonstrate progress made since the submittal date of the application.
- The applicants must have all funding committed and have the ability to enter into contract based on a bidding process within 120 days of the date funds are made available by HUD to the Department.

The maximum amount that a project will receive is \$1 million, which includes general administration costs. Since the total amount of funds requested exceeded the total amount available for allocation, each application was evaluated, scored and ranked against all other applications meeting the threshold requirements above, based upon the following criteria:

- Preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery;
- Assisting those most impacted by the recession;
- Providing investment needed to increase economic efficiency;
- Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits;
- Minimizing or avoiding reductions in essential services; or
- Fostering energy independence.

Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities are available to grantees, HUD strongly suggests that grantees consider the public's perception of the intent of the Recovery Act when identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

GENERAL ALLOCATION

Activity Name:

CDBG-R Public Improvements (PI) – Rehabilitation of a Sewer Pump Station and Wet Well

Activity Narratives:

This activity aims to invest in infrastructure improvements and material will be purchased from a number of local suppliers. Furthermore, the construction of this project, if funded it will create about five temporary construction jobs. The project will serve a population with a significant sector of lower income individuals which are the ones who are impacted most by the recession. Increased efficiency and energy conservation will be achieved by replacing the pump with a new higher-capacity pump.

Jobs Created:

The City is estimating the creation of 3 Full-Time Public Works personnel & 5 Temporary Construction jobs. Supporting additional professional jobs with engineering professionals.

Additional Activity Information:

This application and project proposal consists of the improvement and rehabilitation of the Delta Pump Station Wet Well chamber including replacement of one deteriorated pump within the dry well. The Delta Pump Station is currently at risk of collapse and is difficult to maintain due to risks of injury. This contributes to inefficiencies and increased of level of pollutants. Carrying out the proposed activity would allow for the replacement of the one (1) deficient (out of the existing three) centrifugal raw wastewater pumping units at the Pump Station. In addition, one (1) deteriorated (out of existing three) 700 gallons per minute pumps would be replaced with a new 750 gallons per minute pumps (an existing unit was replaced with a 750 gallons per minute pump in 2006 and the third pump is used as a stand-by).

Activity Name:

CDBG-R Public Infrastructure (PI) – Richgrove Alley Project

Activity Narratives:

Currently, the alleys in the community of Richgrove are unpaved and, at certain times of the year, impassable. This activity aims to invest in infrastructure improvements while promoting energy conservation and improved energy efficiencies that will provide future economic benefit. CDBG-R funds will allow the County to undertake these improvements while providing for energy efficiency installations in CDBG eligible areas. Additionally, with the award of construction contracts the County will be able to quickly create a significant number of jobs.

Jobs Created:

Under this specific activity the County estimates a total of 26 new full-time (20 TIG) construction jobs and 4 full-time (2 TIG) temporary construction jobs will be created. The County also estimates this project will create the need to retain 3.5 (TIG) full-time (FTE) permanent jobs after project completion.

Additional Activity Information:

The County will be employing green building technologies to incorporate both energy and water conservation measures throughout the design and completion of this alley improvement project.

The project calls for the use of porous pavers that allow storm water to percolate into the ground rather than having to be channeled into a retention basin thereby directly recharging groundwater tables.

CDBG-R Public Facility (PF) – Construction of Youth/Cooling Center

Activity Narratives:

This activity aims to invest in new facilities and infrastructure improvements while promoting energy conservation and improved energy efficiencies that will provide future economic benefit. CDBG-R funds will allow the City to provide a new, much needed, highly energy efficient public facility in a CDBG eligible area. Additionally, the award of construction contracts will allow the City the ability to quickly create a significant number of jobs.

Jobs Created:

The City is estimating the creation of 23 new full-time (TIG) and 50 part-time (TIG) jobs. 25 (5 full-time, 20 part-time) will be construction related, however, the City is also estimating that 46 of these newly created jobs will be permanent (18 full-time & 30 part-time) 100% TIG.

Additional Activity Information:

The City will be employing green building strategies and technologies to incorporate energy conservation measures. The Cooling Center will provide an essential service that is not currently available in the community and will reduce the burden on medical care and emergency services. The project also promotes reduced pollution emissions as the new facility will allow individuals to travel far fewer miles to access essential services. In fact, the proposed location (proximity within the city) will allow many recipients the ability to walk to the facility - eliminating the need to drive at all. In addition, the project design calls for the use of solar technologies to supplement other energy sources as well as the use of solar and energy efficient appliances.

Development in the Town of Mammoth Lakes is limited by an Urban Growth Boundary, which defines the extent of new construction. In response to the demand for affordable housing the Town has decided to acquire and rehabilitate an existing structure in order to provide affordable housing to low income individuals. The three unit complex consists of two one-bedroom units and one four-bedroom unit. The complex (in need of rehabilitation) will serve TIG households who are currently over paying and/or living in over crowded conditions. The complex is located within an existing residential neighborhood that is served by local transit.

Jobs Created:

Under this specific activity the Town estimates a total of 11 new full-time (5 TIG) construction jobs. The Town also estimates this project will create the need to retain 5 part-time jobs.

Additional Activity Information:

The County will be employing green building technologies to incorporate both energy conservation and smart growth measures through the completion of this project. New insulation, appliances, finish and fixtures will upgrade the complex to much more efficient standards. All units, fixtures, and appliances will be Energy Star rated, reducing energy costs for tenants.

Activity Name:

CDBG-R Public Infrastructure (PI) – Replacement of Streetlights

Activity Narratives:

Due to serious health and safety issues related to the corrosion of the pole and bolting systems, the City of Firebaugh is proposing to replace 45 street lights along the two main streets in the City of Firebaugh downtown area. The project is located in the center of the City of Firebaugh. This area encompasses the central business district as well as the area around the Fire and Police Department, Post Office, School, City Hall and other service business and intermixed single family housing.

The existing street lights were installed in the early 1950's and have been in use over 55 years. Recently, one pole fell across the adjacent roadway due to the severity of the corrosion. Since the application was submitted an additional 4 poles have been removed. The City Building official has conducted a random audit of 25 poles and the bolting systems and found 100% of the poles inspected were facing imminent failure and need to be replaced immediately.

As of March 2009 the EDD reported the City of Firebaugh as a 26.3% unemployment rate. This community has been hit hard during this economic downturn. The annual average unemployment for this community was 18.7% according to the EDD 2008 average. The community employment depends heavily on the farm community and with the recent land retirements, reduction in water allocations and economic downturn the jobs have not been produced for the farm working community. This has resulted in many families being out of work year round rather than just seasonally.

Jobs Created:

The City estimates the project will retain approximately 10 full-time construction jobs and create 4 full-time construction jobs and retain 2 part time engineering jobs. Additionally, the project will retain 2 permanent public works positions due to maintenance and servicing requirements of the new solar light system.

Additional Activity Information:

The new lights will be a combination solar unit and will greatly reduce energy consumption and maintenance costs. Currently, the City pays over \$300 to replace a single light bulb in each of the existing street lights, because they are required to hire a "boom" operator to hoist the maintenance employee up to the light fixture to replace a bulb. The City does not own a boom that will reach the current lights, thus more costs are incurred. With the installation of the new street lights, the City will no longer require such equipment as the new lights will be on a lower pole and accessible to the maintenance staff. The City currently is required to budget \$45,000 per year to care for the lighting system.

This project provides the City with the necessary lighting system to promote the downtown businesses and encourage residents to utilize local shopping opportunities. The City believes with the installation of these lights not only will it provide the community and business with a

safe corridor but will also greatly increase the access to businesses, promoting a stronger local economy.

The City of Tulelake is proposing to rehabilitate a city water pump and treatment building that were damaged in a 1993 earthquake. There is damage to the water pump itself, damage to the water treatment building, leaking pipes and a failed emergency generator. A minor earthquake could completely collapse the treatment building and leave the low income community without any source of drinking water. This project will complete all necessary repairs needed to continue to provide the community with safe clean drinking water.

Jobs Created:

The City estimates the project will create 2 full-time construction jobs and 1 part-time construction job.

Additional Activity Information:

The city will install solar panels onto the pump house and pressure facilities which will reduce overall energy consumption.

Activity Name:

Public Improvements - Water System

Activity Narratives:

This project aims to benefit primarily lower-income residential users by improving current public service levels while creating immediate job opportunities. The project will connect the main pressure zone of the City's public water system to remote residential users. The area is comprised of approximately 24 families who do not currently have access to public water service, relying entirely on aging private wells for all their water needs. The project also includes the installation of 4 new fire hydrants which will bring a greater level of fire fighting storage and capacity to the neighborhood.

Maximizing Job Creation and Economic Benefit:

During construction, contractors and subcontractors will be employed. The City estimates that construction will take approximately two to three months to complete and will employ an estimated 5 to 7 full time construction workers.

Additional Activity Information:

This project addresses two primary health and safety concerns; 1) insufficient water flows for fire suppression, and, 2) septic seepage into area ground water supplies. With regard to the issue of fire suppression, the local fire department has no immediate access to fire water. The area to be served is rural in nature with abundant native vegetation which creates sever seasonal fire hazards. There is only one fire hydrant in the project area at this time which is inadequate to protect and serve a neighborhood of this size. Secondly, water contamination has been caused by failing septic systems that were installed prior to 1960. The project area has experienced long-term leaching issues with residents complaining about wells drying up in the summer along with consistent year-round reports of poor tasting and discolored water.

The project will boost water pressure by 1,000 gpm by replacing four pressure reducing valves separating two pressure zones, replace undersized water lines, add additional fire hydrants and install flow meters on each side of the water treatment plant.

Underground storm drainage is the necessary first step in facilitating the development of sidewalks and thereby promotes pedestrian travel versus vehicle travel within the community.

Activity Narrative:

CA Organics is expanding from its current location in downtown Nevada City, California to an existing prime commercial area building and will take advantage of the significantly improved visibility and access to public transportation. In addition, the new site is very compatible to riding and pedestrian traffic. It is proposed that the CDBG-R funds will be used for inventory, working capital, and equipment necessary for the expansion. The building is currently being renovated and upgraded by the current owner in anticipation of a new tenant. The renovations to the building are designed to promote energy conservation including new windows, HVAC, additional insulation, and new energy efficient produce and cooler cases.

The expansion will increase CA Organics from 4,000 square feet to 8,000 square feet in retail space and from 2,900 square feet to 5,000 square feet in food production and dining. The larger building and increased inventory will greatly assist the business in increasing sales volume thereby generating additional customers and stimulating additional business in the local

economy. CA Organics currently employs approximately 35 employees and the expansion will create 20 new full time equivalent jobs of which at least 51% will be held by low/moderate income persons. The company anticipates that approximately 80% of the new jobs will be held by low/moderate income persons.

Jobs Created:

CA Organics will be creating 20 new full time equivalent employees and the renovation of the existing building will create or retain up to 60 temporary construction jobs.

Additional Activity Information:

The building is currently being renovated and upgraded by the current owner in anticipation of a new tenant. The renovations to the building are designed to promote energy conservation including new windows, HVAC, additional insulation, and new energy efficient produce and cooler cases. In addition, the new location is close to public transportation and very accessible to riding and pedestrian traffic.

C. PUBLIC COMMENT

In accordance with HUD requirements, the CDBG-R Substantial Amendment to the 2008 Annual Plan (Amendment) was made available to the public for a comment period of seven calendar days (06/18/09 – 06/25/09). The Department has posted the Amendment, and will post any subsequent amendments on its official website. Copies of the Amendment were also provided to various libraries throughout the state. In addition, the Department held three public hearings to solicit comments on the Amendment prior to its final publishing on June 29, 2009. The Department received one comment on the Amendment. The comment and the Department's response are provided below.

Comment

The CDBG-R Substantial Amendment does **NOT** address the CDBG General Allocation for the 2009-2010 applications that are due by July 14, 2009. These applications are being submitted based on additional funding being available through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, and the CDBG-R Substantial Amendment **EXCLUDES** these from being considered. Even though the applicants will not be notified until October 2009, there are many projects that are ready to go and should be considered for the additional funding.

Department Response

The California Department of Housing & Community Development (HCD) exercised very careful consideration regarding the selection of eligible CDBG-R program/project applications. To most expediently, efficiently and successfully fulfill the goals and objectives of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), the Department has elected to adopt and execute an approach suggested by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in their Notice of Program Requirements for Community Development Block Grant Program Funding Under the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 which reads (in part):

States should consider whether their existing method of distribution processes can be employed to fund worthwhile activities that fell below the funding cut-off line from their program year 2008 distribution process, or to fund applications already submitted for their program year 2009 distribution process.

In applying this approach, the department reviewed all unfunded 2008 grant applications receiving a minimum score of 30 readiness points (or more) under the 2008 rating and ranking criteria. Each jurisdiction was contacted to confirm the program/project was still needed/desired, and to confirm whether the proposed project/program would be able to complete the bid process and be under contract within no more than 120 days of approval. Each application was then further analyzed to determine that it would/could meet (or exceed) the specific National objectives and achieve the clear purposes for use of funds as prescribed under ARRA. As time is especially of the essence concerning CDBG-R funding, it is our firm belief that the approach we elected will result in the most appropriate and most prudent application of available CDBG-R funding.
