**Sacramento** – The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) announced record-breaking awards totaling \$73.6 million to help more than 100 cities and counties build much needed parks and/or repair existing parks and recreation facilities within their community.

HCD's Housing-Related Parks Program uses voter-approved funds from the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006 to expand and improve the availability of parks and recreation facilities within communities. The largest share of the funding, 71 percent, is allocated to communities that are both disadvantaged and park-deficient.

HCD expanded its awareness campaign for the Housing-Related Parks Program, and as a result, many more California cities and counties are applying and taking advantage of this useful grant program.

Communities can apply for the funding if they meet a threshold of requirements, including having submitted an approved Housing Element plan. The amount of the award is based on the number of new affordable housing units the city or county has permitted as well as affordable units preserved, rehabilitated and/or acquired since 2010.

One of the awardees, the City of Merced, will use its grant of \$828,775 for improvements to Stephen Leonard Park. Features will include installation and upgrades of various park features including ADA-compliant sidewalks and ramps, playground equipment, landscaping, lighting, climbing rocks, shade structures, bike racks, benches and tables.

“Parks are an invaluable resource for both children and adults, especially in communities that work hard to fulfill requirements for affordable housing,” said Randall A. Deems, HCD Acting Director. “We are especially excited to see the supportive, innovative and environmentally-friendly ways communities plan to use this funding; many are installing ADA compliant sidewalks, ramps and trails. Others are constructing a performing arts stage or replacing natural grass with synthetic turf.”

This is the third time that Housing-Related Parks Program funds have been awarded, and 109 cities and counties received funding to work on more than 200 individual projects.
