

AAP Background

- Second of four annual updates to the 2020-24 Consolidated Plan (Con Plan)
- The AAP is our application for funding to HUD for the FY22 allocation
- HUD programs covered
 - Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
 - HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)
 - National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF)
 - Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG)
 - Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA)
- *HOME-ARP will be incorporated into our FY21 AAP as a Substantial Amendment



AAP Background (cont.)

- Based on the Consolidated Plan's needs assessment and the feedback from this AAP's stakeholder outreach, this AAP maintains the same priority goals:
 - Increase housing affordability
 - Addressing and preventing homelessness
 - Economic Development
 - Maintain or improve public facilities and infrastructure
 - Maintain or improve access to public services
 - Recovery assistance for natural disaster survivors



Highlights - Racial Equity & Tribal Support

- HCD focus on Racial Equity and Tribal support
 - Ensure all eligible persons receive services in a way that is designed to achieve equitable outcomes, and are served with dignity, respect, and compassion regardless of circumstance, ability, or identity, including Black, Indigenous and other people of color – who are disproportionately impacted by COVID-19, poverty, housing segregation and discrimination and homelessness.
 - The Department is committed to supporting Tribes in addressing housing and community development needs by setting aside funds for both federally recognized and unrecognized Native American Tribes and providing dedicated outreach and technical assistance.



Racial Equity & Tribal Support Progress

- HCD focus on Racial Equity and Tribal support
 - HCD staff and management received training on delivering equitable outcomes within programs
 - HCD engaged consultants focused on equity to apply an equity lens to funding applications, and its CDBG Grants Management Manual.
- Tribal Engagement
 - Listening Sessions, Consultation, and Technical Assistance
 - CDBG-CV, HOME, HOME-ARP, NHTF, ESG-CV
 - Funding
 - \$3.8 Million set-aside from CDBG-CV
 - \$8.7 in applications (19 applications for 21 projects)
 - \$8.5 awarded (19 applications awarded)
- All DFFA staff attended training on working with Tribes

Activities undertaken by Program

- CDBG Community and Economic Development
- HOME Affordable Housing
- ESG Houselessness assistance and prevention
- NHTF Affordable Housing for extremely low-income households
- HOPWA Housing assistance and supportive services to prevent or reduce homelessness for persons living with HIV



CDBG Program Summary

- **Purpose:** Increase housing opportunities, expand economic opportunities, and lift up communities through a variety of activities, including public improvements, planning and technical assistance, and economic development.
- **Serves:** HCD serves smaller cities and counties, mostly rural, that do not receive funds directly from HUD, with a focus on benefiting Californians with low and moderate incomes.



CDBG Methods of Distribution

- Eligible applicants: CDBG non-entitlement jurisdictions
- Competitive distribution:
 - Housing Assistance Programs
 - Non-Housing Programs (Public Services and Public Facilities)
 - Economic Development Programs
 - Colonias set-aside and non-recognized Tribal set-aside
- Over-The-Counter distribution:
 - Economic Development Capital Projects



ESG Program Summary

- Purpose: Provides funds for a variety of activities to address homelessness as authorized under the federal Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act of 2009
- Serves: Homeless individuals and families living on the street or in shelters, individuals and families at risk of becoming homeless
- Eligible applicants: Local governments and nonprofit service providers



ESG Method of Distribution

- **ESG Annual Allocation:** formula based on point-in-time homelessness count, poverty rate, housing cost burden
 - Continuum of Care Allocation (CoC): To be eligible to participate in the Continuum of Care Allocation, the
 Continuum of Care shall recommend an Administrative Entity that meets the following criteria:
 - Is a Unit of General Purpose local government that has administered ESG funds for an Entitlement Area during at least one of the past five years.
 - Has no unresolved ESG monitoring findings with HUD or the Department that the Department determines
 poses a substantial risk to the Department if the Administrative Entity is approved; and
 - Demonstrates the ability and willingness to perform the functions of an Administrative Entity pursuant to federal and State ESG requirements.

Balance of State Allocation:

- CoC may select providers to receive a portion of these funds non-competitively for Rapid Rehousing
- Remainder of Balance of State allocation is awarded competitively within 3 regional allocations (Northern, Bay Area, Central/Imperial Valley)



ESG Method of Distribution (cont.)

Eligible Activities:

- Homelessness Prevention
- Street Outreach
- Emergency Shelters
- Rapid Re-Housing Assistance
- Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- Admin
- Method of Distribution subject to change in future AAPs contingent on adoption of State ESG Guidelines



HOME Program Summary

- Purpose: Increase supply of housing affordable to Californians priced out of the rental and purchase markets, and rehabilitate or reconstruct substandard homes.
- Serves: Californians of modest means who need an affordable place to live.
- Eligible applicants: HOME non-entitlement/affiliated jurisdictions, developers, CHDOs, and Tribal entities.
- Eligible program and project locations: State HOME-eligible jurisdictions.



HOME Method of Distribution

All HOME funding awarded competitively (unless supply exceeds demand)

- Project Activities:
 - Rental New Construction/Rehabilitation
 - First-Time Homebuyer New Construction (subdivisions)
- Program Activities:
 - First-Time Homebuyer Assistance (to individuals)
 - Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation
 - Tenant-Based Rental Assistance
- HOME accepting applications in only eCivis for the first time in its 2020-2021 NOFA
- HOME allowing Tribal entities to apply for both Program Activities and Project
 Activities for the first time in its 2020-2021 NOFA, with a 20% Tribal set-aside for
 each of these two



National Housing Trust Fund (NHTF) Program Summary

- **Purpose:** To increase and preserve the supply of affordable housing for Californians with the lowest incomes.
- **Serves:** Extremely low-income households at or below 30 percent of the Area Median Income (AMI) with a specific focus on Permanent Supportive Housing for people experiencing homelessness, to the extent the pipeline exists.
- Funded by: Annual allocation funded by an assessment on loans made by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac.



NHTF Method of Distribution

- Eligible Applicants/Recipients: Organizations, agencies, or other entities that are owners and/or developers, including:
 - Public Housing Agencies
 - For-Profit Entities
 - Non-Profit Entities

Eligible Uses:

- Loans for Acquisition and New Construction (and related eligible soft costs)
- Rehabilitation will be eligible once HCD's NHTF Rehabilitation Standards are implemented

Project Type:

- Multifamily Rental Housing, targeted at ELI households (30% AMI)
- Permanent Supportive Housing for people experiencing homelessness, to the extent the pipeline exists



NHTF – Outlook 2022

FY22 NHTF NOFA to be released in August 2022

- California's allocation is estimated at \$135 million
- NHTF will be a standalone program, funds will no longer be made available through the Housing for a Healthy California (HHC) Program

Program Changes:

- Capitalized Operating Subsidy Reserve (COSR) Grants are no longer eligible, pending guidance from HUD re eligible operating costs
- Per unit subsidy limits increased last year to better align with actual costs of building affordable housing in California
- Disbursements may be made at the time of construction closing and during the construction period, in addition to permanent closing

HOPWA Program Summary

- Purpose: The Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) program provides housing assistance and supportive services to prevent or reduce homelessness for persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWH).
- Serves: Persons living with HIV/AIDS who are experiencing homelessness or who are at-risk of homelessness.



HOPWA Method of Distribution

- California Department of Public Health, Office of AIDS (CDPH/OA) administers the HOPWA program.
 - Eligible applicants: State HOPWA serves counties that do not qualify to receive HOPWA grant funds directly from HUD.
 - Eligible uses: TBRA, STRMU, Facility Based Housing,
 Permanent Housing Placement Assistance, Housing Information Services, and Supportive Services.
 - Target population: Persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWH) who are experiencing homelessness or who are at-risk of homelessness.


How will the State address public policies (local and statewide) that serve as barriers to affordable housing?

 - Improving coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies


