Executive Summary:

The 2013 Rim Fire destroyed 257,314 acres of land in Tuolumne County and ranks as the third largest wildfire in State history. The fire burned for over two months through large portions of the Stanislaus National Forest, threatening surrounding communities and damaging the critical watershed for local communities, the San Joaquin Valley, and San Francisco (City/County). Unfortunately, the Rim Fire is not an isolated incident. In 2016, a total of 2,986 fires consumed 564,835 California acres. Despite a record snowfall, 2,134 fires have consumed 22,817 acres in California during the period between January 1 and June 18, 2017.

The Rim Fire's direct emergency response cost was \$127 million and estimates of environmental damage range up to \$736 million. In September 2015, the Valley and Butte Fires burned over 145,000 acres, destroyed 2,728 structures and resulted in 7 deaths. California's prolonged severe drought and related epidemic tree mortality magnifies risk, coupled with 2017's above average rain and snow fall levels which creates fuel loading grasses and vegetation that can readily be ignited in summer thunderstorms.

Fires have serious consequences for local communities, including public health impacts, property damage, and economic disruption. They also threaten the backbone watersheds of the State's water system; sixty percent of the State's water supply originates in California's Sierra Nevada region.

The Community and Watershed Resilience Program (CWRP) provides an innovative, revenue-generating, scalable, and replicable model for similar regions throughout California and the western United States. Developed in partnership with federal and local government agencies, community organizations, and private business, the CWRP is built around partnerships and practices designed to overcome the financial and institutional barriers to sustainable, healthy forests and watersheds. The CWRP will also facilitate the transition to a sustainable forest economy in our rural communities. The State of California's Community and Watershed Health Resilience Program is composed of activities in three complementary pillars: 1). Forest and Watershed Health Project (FWHP) five activities include: fuels reduction and biomass removal, noxious weed abatement, rangeland infrastructure restoration, fuel break expansions, and reforestation within the Rim Fire burn area, designed to improve forest and watershed health and resilience against disturbances; 2). The Biomass Utilization Fund ("BUF") will provide low cost financing to economic development projects that utilize low value forest waste removed from local forests to assist in reducing wildfire fuel loads. The BUF program will also provide financing for public facility projects that are able to install and utilize alternative energy generation; and 3). Up to two Community Resilience Centers, designed to increase community resilience by providing year round services, including education and job training to support forest and watershed work and the biomass facility. These facilities will be a model for serving rural communities. HUD granted a limited waiver modifying 42 U.S.C. 5305(c)(2)(A)(i) to the extent necessary to permit the state to use a percentage of not less than 38 percent to qualify activities under the low-and moderate-income area benefit national objective in the August 7, 2017 Federal Register Notice. MID-URN AREAS: The Target Area includes the Rim Fire burn and evacuation and evacuation warning areas (Rim Fire Burn Scar, Evacuation Areas) in Census Tracts 06109002200, 06109004100, 06109003100, 06109003200, 06109004200. The State is incorporating resilience and replicability for forest and watershed health activities. This includes, creating fuel breaks, reforestation, biomass removal, rangeland improvements and noxious weed treatments to reestablish carbon storage in living trees, help prevent future fires, reduce invasive species, and provide jobs and revenue to help build a strong rural economy.

The BUF will provide low cost financing to economic development and public facility projects that provide a marketable end-

use for biomass removed from within the county, lessen Tuolumne County's reliance on imported energy, reducing greenhouse gases, and producing jobs in the region.

The Community Resilience Centers (CRCs) will provide social resilience to Tuolumne and surrounding counties. Tuolumne County is a regional leader in responding to disasters, with the region's only food bank and major evacuation center. Therefore, during emergencies in neighboring counties, they often turn to Tuolumne County for support. The proposed resilience centers will be located in communities selected with input from the residents in the County.

The Rim Fire destroyed permanent public infrastructure, including the ingress egress road systems, as well as erosion and landslides that undermine the integrity of the system and wear and tear from ongoing fire recovery efforts have caused additional damage. The Rim Fire destroyed rangelands, fencing, and water troughs that had been in use by cattle ranchers under long-term agreements with the USFS and now prevents grazing in the forest.

The damage from the Rim Fire has long-lasting effects well beyond the forests. Local communities, which are closely linked to the health of forests through timber, wood products, the recreation industry and tourism, continue to suffer from the business losses and closures caused by the fire, the direct public health impacts, and depressed property values. Damage to downstream water storage and supply, as well as the long-term implications for carbon storage, all have global effects. From a regional perspective, the Target Area has experienced regular wildfire events, as shown in the Tuolumne Burn History Map. The 1987 Complex Fire burned 157,000 acres in Tuolumne County, much of which burned again in the Rim Fire. Natural regeneration of trees following wildfires that burn as hot as the Complex and Rim fires is often insufficient, resulting in conversion from forest to grass and shrub lands, which are more susceptible to high severity fires and store substantially less carbon than healthy forests. Overall Progress Narrative:

The Community and Watershed Resilience Program (CWRP) continues to progress toward its overall goal to support community protection and resilience from future fires. To date, the program has expended over half of its entire grant allocation, with the two community resilience centers (CRCs) projected to meet construction completion in Q4 2022. The County has expended approximately 80% of its contract award for the construction of the centers. The United States Forest Service (USFS) has expended approximately \$18M of work to date on the Forest and Watershed Health Project (FWHP) with reported activity completions in both the noxious weed removal and restoration/reforestation projects. RCAC has submitted closing conditions for the first Biomass Utilization Fund (BUF) loan project and is working to complete the Environmental Assessment for a second project. HCD has completed contract amendments for all activity partners to allow program activities to continue into 2023, with GCR/Civix and SNC supporting HCD and the pillar working groups in those program objectives. As HCD starts to prepare for grant closeout, the activity toolkits and story map are now underway in an effort to support the replicability of these efforts in the future.

Activity Description:

The CRC feasibility study determined that additional funding would be needed to build two facilities. HCD was able to obligate an additional \$5.5 million dollars in Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) State Program Income funds, to add to the \$18 million in NDR funds for the CRC to allow for the second CRC to be constructed. The \$5.5 million in NSP funds is committed to the Groveland CRC, which has additional development costs. The two CRC facilities are currently in construction with a completion date of fall 2022.

Upon completion of construction the two Community Resilience Centers (under the public facility activity) will provide a number of different year-round public services (food distribution, education and employment training) to the residents of Groveland and Tuolumne. During emergencies, the CRCs will provide evacuation and resources for residents in the Rim Fire impacted area of Tuolumne County and the surrounding areas.

(CCC) staff. Fuel break expansions on public lands will be done by USFS with NDR funds. Fuel break expansion work on private lands will be done with CAL FIRE state funding.

These activities will support healthy, resilient forests through restoration, reforestation and other science-based investments to ensure ecosystems health.

Activity Description:

Five activities will take place under the FWHP: 1) fuels reduction and biomass removal; 2) noxious weed abatement; 3) reforestation/tree planting; 4) rangeland infrastructure replacement of fencing, cattle guard crossings, corrals and drinking troughs; 5) expansion of fuel breaks on public and private lands. The FWHP activities will start with noxious weed treatments and fuels reduction activities, including a limited amount of biomass removal. The fuels reduction and weed treatments will be in preparation for tree planting. Rangeland replacement infrastructure will be done with USFS staff, contractors and California Conservation Corp. (CCC) staff. Specifically, fence replacement to allow for cattle grazing. Activity includes removal of existing damaged fencing and reconstructing fences in compliance with USFS standards. These activities will support healthy, resilient forests through restoration, reforestation and other science-based investments to ensure ecosystems health.

Location Description:
