Stakeholders	Description of how stakeholders were invited and encouraged to engage in the public stakeholder process	Describe the specific input from stakeholders that was incorporated into the Plan
People with lived experience of homelessness, including but not limited to survivors of domestic violence.	The CoC and County regularly host public meetings and invite persons with lived experience of homelessness as well as survivors of domestic violence. Not only does the CoC Council have a seat dedicated to a person with lived experience of homelessness, but there are also several Councilmembers that have lived experience. In addition to Council, CoC membership consists of many people with lived experience. Membership regularly provides input in CoC meetings as well as during subcommittee meetings. The CoC meeting space and list-serv were utilized to invite as many people as possible with lived experience of homelessness. Additionally, the CoC hosted a Lived Experience Focus Group, and used the feedback from the group to inform both the HHAP 6 process as well as the CoC's long-term strategy toward ending homelessness. The local victim service provider (VSP) is a very active CoC member, with the executive director acting as CoC chair for several years, through the end of 2023. Through the VSP's participation, survivors of domestic violence were both invited and represented to attend the public meetings.	Attendees provided feedback as follows. What types of services have been the most helpful? What was it that made them helpful? • Groups and life skills classes were helpful to "re-learn" how to do a lot of things while addressing substance use disorders. • Emergency shelters provide much needed reprieve and supports for individuals with physical disabilities that have difficulty functioning while experiencing unsheltered homelessness. • The behavioral health crisis line, mental health services, and substance use services provided supports needed to regain housing and employment. • Emergency shelters provide human connections that are often missing when experiencing unsheltered homelessness. • Job skills programs not only provide an opportunity to learn a new skill, but also provide a sense of purpose and accomplishment. • Animal friendly emergency shelters reduce barriers to entry and allow individuals to get the support they need while also maintaining the companionship established with their pet. What barriers to accessing services have you, or someone you know, experienced. • Credit checks for apartment applications, they can reduce already moderate to low credit scores. Some individuals don't have credit or a way to establish it. • Debt is a significant barrier due to its impacts to credit and potential for wage garnishment. Debt forgiveness was suggested.

- Lack of transportation and having very few people to rely on.
- Rent is too high compared to income.
- Criminal record caused by homelessness significantly reduces housing options.
- Lack of awareness of available resources can lead to homelessness and cause a lot of delays in becoming housed again.
- Systems that lead to homelessness, i.e., domestic violence led to eviction, led to children being detained, led to loss of CalWORKs, led to homelessness and significantly increased hardship to family reunification.

What services are missing locally?

- Assistance in regaining employment. Job loss and a lack of support in finding employment led to homelessness.
- Transportation in rural areas is insufficient making access to employment without a vehicle nearly impossible.
- Additional homelessness prevention programs and transitional housing.
- Low-cost veterinary services.

What type of housing would you like to live in?

- House without shared walls
- RV
- Studio apartment alone
- House or apartment
- Shared housing
- Actually affordable housing

What do you need to get into housing right now?

- Additional housing navigation services and more case management.
- More mental health services.
- More job internships, on the job training programs, temporary work, etc.
- Additional victim service providers to increase access to services.

		♣ The input of people with lived experience of homelessness, including survivors of domestic violence, was incorporated into the plan through Key Action 1, Increase Interim Housing, and Key Action 5, Maintain Operations and Services Coordination in Interim Housing. These Key Actions support the feedback received, specifically the importance of supporting Interim Shelter and the direct access to Services Coordination provided within.
Youth with lived experience of homelessness.	Butte County Office of Education (BCOE) and a non-profit youth services organization hold seats on the CoC Council. CoC membership also has representatives from a variety of local school districts and higher education. Through their meeting attendance and the use of the CoC list-serv, youth are represented and invited to attend the public meetings. Additionally, the CoC hosted a Lived Experience Focus Group, which include youth members, and used the feedback from the group to inform both the HHAP 6 process as well as the CoC's long-term strategy toward ending homelessness.	Attendees provided feedback as follows. What types of services have been the most helpful? What was it that made them helpful? • Receiving supports from youth dedicated services. What barriers to accessing services have you, or someone you know, experienced? • Not enough youth specific advocates. • Not enough services for youth that are doubled up or in subpar housing. What type of housing would you like to live in? • Tiny homes What do you need to get into housing right now? • More group therapy with room for self-expression. ♣ Youth with lived experience of homelessness called out the importance of youth-dedicated programs. Key Action 4, Preventing and Ending Homelessness through Rapid Rehousing, Homelessness Prevention, and Diversion, was incorporated into the plan based on this feedback. The region does not currently operate interim housing dedicated to youth but does have programs dedicated to providing

services coordination and permanent housing to youth. Key Action 4 will continue to provide support to preventing and ending homelessness for youth.

Local department leaders and staff of qualifying smaller jurisdictions, including child welfare, public welfare, health care, behavioral health, justice, and education system leaders.

Through the CoC, local department leaders and staff from smaller jurisdictions are regular meeting attendees. This includes City of Chico city council, administration, public works, and housing programs; City of Oroville city council, housing programs, and code enforcement; City of Gridley city council; Town of Paradise town council; County employment and social services (includes child welfare and adult protective services), behavioral health, development services (includes code enforcement), public health, probation, sheriff's office; county office of education, local elementary and secondary school districts, and higher education; and healthcare systems including managed care plans and for profit hospitals. All were present during the public meetings.

Attendees provided feedback as follows.

Positive achievements within the CoC and what made those successes happen:

- HMIS expansion and open system has allowed for more efficient cross-agency collaboration and a significant reduction in the re-traumatization of individuals and families seeking assistance.
- Streamlining of the Coordinated Entry System (CES) has led to improving successful housing placements. Increasing CES access points and including a call center access point.
- Collaboration with the Public Housing Authority increasing efficiency and effectiveness of available housing vouchers.
- Coordination with non-profits that serve aged and disabled households.

What will it take to address challenges and gaps in services:

- Increased availability of housing subsidies, sustainability of existing subsidies.
- Housing solutions for renters impacted by natural disasters and streamlining available resources.

♣ Local department leaders and staff spoke to the importance of supporting the increasing aged and disabled populations of persons experiencing homelessness, as well as supporting renters impacted by natural disasters. This input informed both Key Action 2, Increasing Permanent Supportive Housing, and Key Action 4, Preventing and Ending Homelessness through Rapid Rehousing, Homelessness

		Prevention, and Diversion. While there are no longer specific programs in the region dedicated to serving persons impacted by natural disaster, the availability of Rapid Rehousing, Homelessness Prevention, and Diversion will support those individuals and families.
Homeless services and housing providers, including developers of permanent affordable housing operating within the region.	The CoC includes housing providers and developers that are very active within the CoC. Developers often work through the CoC to lease up units when they become available. The CoC also includes the Public Housing Authority, with a staff member holding a seat on CoC Council. Housing providers and developers were in attendance at the public meetings. Also, in attendance were homeless service providers, their responses can be found under "Street medicine providers, victim service providers, and other service providers directly assisting people ..."	Attendees provided feedback as follows. Positive achievements within the CoC and what made those successes happen: - A variety of natural disasters caused a high demand for affordable housing. The availability of Disaster Recovery funding attracted new and additional developers, leading to quicker development of units. What will it take to address challenges and gaps in services: - Funding as it currently exists is not appropriately sized and there is an over-demand for limited funding. Housing could be developed more quickly if there was appropriate funding instead of the years-long wait to braid funding as well as the complexity of navigating a variety of funds. ♣ Housing providers spoke to the importance of established relationships with new and additional developers. This feedback aligns with the importance of continued cross agency collaboration and informed Key Action 6, Coordinate Services with Mainstream Supports.
Each Medi-Cal Managed Care Plan contracted with the State Department of Health Care Services in the region.	The local region includes one Managed Care Plan, Partnership Health. Partnership was and continues to be invited to CoC activities, including HHAP 6 related public meetings.	The local MCP (Butte County has one) was invited but not in attendance at any of the public meetings.
Street medicine providers, victim service providers, and other service providers directly assisting people	The only current street medicine provide is an active CoC member and was invited to the public meetings.	Attendees provided feedback as follows. Positive achievements within the CoC

within the region experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.

The local victim service provider (VSP) is a very active CoC member, with the executive director acting as CoC chair for several years, through the end of 2023. The VSP was an active participant during the public meetings.

Many non-profit services providers were active participants at public meetings. These non-profits included those that serve the general population experiencing homelessness as well as those serving youth, veterans, aged, disabled, and chronic homeless. There was also representation from culturally specific service providers.

and what made those successes happen:

- Streamlining of the Coordinated Entry System (CES) has led to improving successful housing placements. Increasing CES access points and including a call center access point.
- Expanding workforce development, adding veterinary care, and increasing other wraparound services.
- Adding a Navigation Center.
- Building relationships with private property owners and increasing the affordable housing stock by using those relationships to master lease units and facilitate shared housing.
- Providing housing navigation services for individuals and families coming into interim housing and exiting into permanent housing.

What will it take to address challenges and gaps in services:

- Increased housing development and housing subsidies.
- Developers often have either financial capacity or experiencing pairing state and federal funds. There is a need for developers with financial capacity to team up with developers that have the experience.
- There is a need for longer-term support for disaster survivors, once disaster case-management term limits are met, there are still individuals and families that are experiencing homelessness and/or those that need continued support.
- There is a continued need to support interim housing.
- There is a continued need to expand the availability of housing navigation services as it is difficult to traverse the rental market.
- There is insufficient support of and availability of homesharing.

♣ Street medicine providers, VSPs, and others directly assisting people experiencing homelessness

indicated the importance of supporting Interim Housing, navigation centers and housing navigation, as well as workforce development and wraparound services. This informed Key Action 5, Maintain Operations and Services Coordination in Interim Housing. Additionally, this group of stakeholders addressed a need for increased housing subsidies, leading to Key Action 4, Preventing and Ending Homelessness through Rapid Rehousing, Homelessness Prevention, and Diversion.

The CoC continues to coordinate with the local tribes and invite them to attend public meetings. While tribal leadership was not in attendance, local tribe members did attend public meetings.

Documentation of Stakeholder Engagement Narrative - Stakeholder Input

An anonymous survey was conducted and sent out via email and posted a QR code to gather feedback on local priorities and how they have shifted over the past ten years. Respondents included persons with lived experience, homeless services providers, housing providers, government staff, community members, agencies seeking funding, and others. Because the survey was anonymous, the responses were not separated based on the stakeholder group each individual represented, but as an accumulation of responses.

Respondents were asked to identify which actions should be considered high priority. The highest ranked priorities included: addressing first time homelessness; addressing chronic homelessness; identification and prioritization of housing solutions that have proven to be successful in the region; providing

wraparound/supportive services to help people access and maintain housing; and addressing the needs of persons with mental health, substance use disorders, developmental and/or physical disabilities.

When asked which populations should be prioritized, the most common response was seniors/older adults. Other special populations were called out, including racial and ethnic minorities, veterans, youth, LGBTQ+, disabled, domestic violence survivors, and justice involved.

Additionally, the following information was provided when asked for thoughts on solutions to homelessness:

- Homelessness is unique to the individual/family experiencing homelessness, and services and interventions need to be right sized based on the need.
- Further collaboration between service providers and Sober Living Environments would lead to additional options for individuals looking for assistance with substance use.
- Strengthen coordination between CoC and BHSA.
- Managed campgrounds, safe parking, additional non-congregate shelters.
- More low-cost housing.
- Ongoing and dedicated funding.
- Reducing barriers to new construction.
- Additional mental health and substance use services.
- Creating a flexible housing pool.
- Support interim housing and stabilization services.

Regional Roles, Responsibilities, and Housing and Homelessness Service Policies

3.a. Regional Partners' Roles and Responsibilities

3.a.1. Outreach and Site Coordination

Eligible Applicant	Describe roles and responsibilities in outreach to individuals experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, homelessness in the region, and in coordination on citing of services, shelters, and interim and permanent housing in the region
Chico, Paradise/Butte County CoC	There are several CoC membership agencies that conduct outreach throughout the county. The CoC provides space for resources and best practices to be disseminated. The CoC Policy and Procedure also outlines the Outreach process for all membership agencies including Housing First principles, Progressive Engagement, and Coordinated Entry integration. The CoC continues to provide access to trainings on best practices as well as regularly reviewing and updating the associated Policy and Procedure. Monthly CoC meetings provide a centralized forum for local jurisdictions, government entities, service providers, and community members to coordinate efforts to provide services for individuals and families at risk of or experiencing homelessness. For example, through the CoC, Outreach providers are able to coordinate with Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, and Permanent Housing providers to ensure persons experiencing homelessness have direct access to a variety of shelter opportunities.
Butte County	Butte County, through the Department of Employment and Social Services (DESS), operates the Housing & Homeless Connection Center. In addition to a location in which the public can seek out housing and related services, it is also the hub for the Housing Navigators that conduct outreach countywide. DESS coordinates with staff from Butte County Sheriff's Office, Butte County Development Services – Code Enforcement, Butte County Behavioral Health, Butte County Public Health, local jurisdictions, and non-profit service providers to provide a multi-pronged approach to providing services directly to community members experiencing or at-risk of homelessness. Additionally, DESS serves the CoC as the Administrative Entity, Lead Agency, and Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) Lead for the CoC. This collaboration between the County and CoC provides for a seamless service delivery system.

3.a.2. Siting and Use of Available Land

Eligible Applicant	Describe how the Eligible Applicant will coordinate efforts to identify and promote use of available land for the production of interim or permanent housing in the region
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Chico, Paradise/Butte County CoC	The CoC provides a forum for cross jurisdiction coordination as well as for invested parties to be involved in the conversation around land use and development. The space made available through the CoC allows for a wide variety of partners to collaborate and pool resources.
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Butte County	The County coordinates efforts to develop available land for housing. Although the County does not have any excess land available, the County, through the Administration Department, works with non-profits, developers, and private parties to ensure land is developed into housing appropriate for the area, while leveraging available funding. As the Administrative Lead and Lead Agency to the CoC, the County facilitates meetings alongside local jurisdictions to discuss current housing projects, land use, and development.
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3.a.3. Development of Shelter, Interim and Permanent Housing Options

Eligible Applicant	Describe your engagement with housing developers, including developers of permanent supportive housing, to coordinate the financing of interim and permanent housing
Chico, Paradise/Butte County CoC	The CoC assists with funding housing through grant administration and coordination. Also, the CoC provides a forum for cross jurisdiction coordination with developers to ensure buy-in from a wide variety of partners and collaboration to pool resources.
Butte County	The County, local jurisdictions, and service providers provide emergency shelter, interim housing, and permanent housing options throughout the area. The County, local jurisdictions, and CoC work collaboratively to obtain available local, state, and federal funds, locate available land and existing infrastructure, and coordinate with developers. This coordination allows for a higher success rate in the approval of permanent housing and permanent supportive housing. For example, the County worked closely with the City of Chico, a non-profit service provider, and a for profit developer to expand interim shelter beds and construct an adjoining navigation center.

3.a.4. Coordination of and Connection to Service Delivery

Chico, Paradise/Butte County CoC	The CoC assists in coordination and connection through CoC meetings and cross agency collaboration. The CoC also maintains the Policy and Procedure, providing consistency in service provision

countywide.

The CoC also operates several committees, providing a space for member agencies to share resources and best practices as relates to specific populations of people experiencing homelessness. For example, the Chronic Homelessness Committee consists of members from Butte County Behavioral Health, DESS, healthcare providers, and non-profits. The membership within this committee collaborates on housing and service opportunities such as those offered through the Housing Counselors at Behavioral Health.

Additionally, CoC membership consists of over 40 agencies that provide direct services to individuals and families experiencing or at risk of homelessness. These agencies provide regular updates to CoC membership regarding the services they offer, to ensuring that no matter how an individual experiencing homelessness is connected to services, they are connected to an agency with access to all others within the Continuum.

Butte County

The County, through DESS, provides resources through three locations in three different cities within the county. These locations provide a centralized location for streamlined access to public assistance, employment resources, and housing navigation. These locations also provide connection to services provided by other entities.

Currently, DESS operates the Housing & Homeless Connection Center, which provides direct access to resources as well as triage to other agencies with a variety of available services.

DESS works very closely with Behavioral Health to ensure that there are appropriate referrals for MHSA/BHSA services for individuals that may qualify.

Any encampment cleanup or enforcement provides a minimum of 72 hours' notice with notification of how belongings will be treated during enforcement.

Additionally, Butte County Departments of Development Services (DDS) and DESS have maintained a longstanding partnership focused on providing person-centered, trauma-informed approaches to address the needs of individuals living in encampments on public property, outside of those targeted through ERF programs.

Coordinated efforts involve collaboration among DDS Code Enforcement Officers, DESS Housing Navigators, Behavioral

Addressing Encampments. While no formal policy exists, the County remains dedicated to continuing its efforts to resolve individuals' and family's instances of unsheltered homelessness through Housing First, trauma-informed and person-centered processes.

Health Counselors, and Sheriff's Deputies, when necessary, to ensure respectful treatment of individuals experiencing homelessness and their belongings, with careful attention to health and safety considerations.
