shelter beds for minors, difficulty maintaining education, and insufficient youth-focused behavioral health resources. The plan calls for expanded youth-specific shelter capacity, stronger partnerships with schools, and dedicated youth behavioral health specialists- including the Behavioral Health Center for Youth planned for Glenn County.

Local department leaders and staff of qualifying smaller jurisdictions, including child welfare, public welfare, health care, behavioral health, justice, and education system leaders.

County and city department heads (child welfare, public welfare, public health, behavioral health, justice, education) were invited to planning sessions via formal letters and regional CoC meetings.

Departments emphasized the need for coordinated discharge planning from hospitals and jails, cross-system data sharing, and better integration with child welfare services. The plan commits to formal discharge protocols, improved HMIS data sharing agreements, and specialized housing navigation services for youth exiting foster care.

Homeless services and housing providers, including developers of permanent affordable housing operating within the region.

Providers participated in workshops and surveys distributed through the CoC network. Developers were invited via housing consortium meetings.

Providers identified barriers in siting new housing developments, delays in permitting, and workforce shortages. They also requested streamlined access to flexible funding. The plan includes advocating for expedited permitting, supporting housing workforce development initiatives, and expanding flexible funding pools.

Each Medi-Cal Managed Care Plan contracted with the State Department of Health Care Services in the region.

Each contracted MCP in the region was invited to participate in joint planning sessions with the CoC and public health agencies.

MCPs emphasized the need for alignment between Enhanced Care Management (ECM) and housing navigation, as well as improved communication channels with housing providers. The plan establishes regular coordination meetings between MCPs and housing providers and commits to aligning ECM services with supportive housing case management.

Street medicine providers, victim service providers, and other service providers directly assisting people within the region experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.

Direct service providers were invited to participate in joint planning sessions with the CoC and public health agencies.

Providers highlighted the need for mobile health teams, expanded access to harm reduction services, and stronger collaboration between medical and housing providers. The plan expands harm reduction programming, and develops cross-training for housing and health staff.

Federally recognized tribal governments pursuant to Section 4103 of Title 25 of the United States Code that are within the region.

Tribal representatives of Grindstone Rancheria were invited to participate, via email, in joint planning sessions with the CoC and public health agencies. No Tribal representatives attended the meetings.

The plan commits to formal consultation with tribes in all major funding decisions, and inclusion of culturally responsive service models. The CoC is committed to a structured and intentional approach to Tribal engagement. This includes continued direct outreach to Grindstone Rancheria, to include utilizing multiple methods of communication such as email, phone outreach, and coordination through identified tribal points of contact or tribal stakeholder groups.

### **Colusa County**

The Street Outreach Team provides direct, field-based engagement with individuals experiencing homelessness, including consistent monthly outreach. The team conducts initial assessments to understand each individual's unique needs and completes Coordinated Entry as part of a person-centered and housing-focused approach. Through ongoing engagement, the team builds trust-based relationships with individuals and collaborates closely with county partners.

In addition to connecting individuals to local shelters, interim housing, and permanent housing programs, the team also assesses eligibility for a range of supportive funding programs, including the Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP), Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH), Home Safe, Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and the Housing Support Program (HSP). Outreach staff further coordinate access to critical services such as mental health care, substance use disorder (SUD) treatment, and public benefits, ensuring a holistic approach to stabilization and housing placement.

### **Glenn County**

The Street Outreach Team provides direct, field-based engagement with individuals experiencing homelessness, including consistent monthly outreach. The team conducts initial assessments to understand each individual's unique needs and completes Coordinated Entry as part of a person-centered and housing-focused approach. Through ongoing engagement, the team builds trust-based relationships with individuals and collaborates closely with county partners.

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### **Trinity County**

With a growing unsheltered population, Trinity County is expanding street outreach to connect with individuals in encampments, vehicles, and other places not meant for human habitation. Although encampments in Trinity County are transient and mobile, consistent outreach is required to maintain engagement, assess needs, and connect individuals to housing and services.

We are an active participant in the Coordinated Entry System (CES), using standardized assessment tools to prioritize those with the highest needs. Our trained staff ensure that intake and placement processes are equitable, person-centered, and informed by lived experience. Through CES, we maintain strong partnerships with

service providers, housing authorities, and community-based organizations, enabling efficient referrals and seamless coordination of services.

The Ad Hoc workgroup, in partnership with the newly formed Homeless Outreach Team, offers a range of services—from addressing food insecurity to connecting individuals with medical care, behavioral health services, and housing navigation. Outreach is conducted through camp walks involving HHSA’s housing, public assistance, Human Response Network, behavioral health, and adult protective services staff, alongside local law enforcement, which included Probation and Sheriff Department staff. These direct engagements allow staff to build trust, assess needs, and provide immediate resources.

Rural Focus: As a rural county with limited housing stock, DHHS prioritizes creative and flexible sites used to expand housing capacity.

Demonstrated Success: The County's Winter Shelter Program, funded through previous HHAP rounds and entering its third year, utilizes vacant Migrant Housing units during the off-season—a model demonstrating strong coordination and effective use of available land and resources for interim housing.

Glenn County

The County is currently coordinating with local partners to expand the capacity of its existing Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) apartment complex by adding 18 new units. Both the existing complex and the planned expansion utilize the Coordinated Entry process to prioritize and serve the most vulnerable individuals experiencing homelessness in our community.

Trinity County

The County is also pursuing capital development for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units to address the severe shortage of available rentals. Current capacity for permanent housing falls far short of demand. Funding from the Behavioral Health Bridge Housing Program, the Behavioral Health Services Act, HHAP, and other state and federal sources will be leveraged to expand housing opportunities, reduce homelessness, and implement Housing First principles through a whole-person care approach.

### 3.a.3. Development of Shelter, Interim and Permanent Housing Options

Colusa County

DHHS Housing Team: Works to identify and engage individuals and families who are unsheltered or at risk of homelessness. Staff provide assessments, service referrals, and direct connections to emergency shelter, behavioral health support, and housing navigation services. Bridge Housing Program: Serves as a transitional resource that helps participants stabilize, connect with case management, and move toward permanent housing. Staff collaborate with outreach workers to prioritize individuals most in need and ensure continuity of care from engagement to housing placement.

Behavioral Health: Coordinates with outreach and housing programs to address mental health and substance use needs that may be barriers to obtaining and maintaining housing stability.

Community Partners and Regional Coordination: Colusa County DHHS collaborates with the local Continuum of Care (CoC), neighboring counties, and community-based organizations to share data, align outreach strategies, and coordinate the siting of services, shelters, and interim and permanent housing. This collaboration supports consistent service delivery and resource optimization across the region.

County Leadership and Planning: Participate in regional discussions and planning efforts related to the development and siting of new

housing and service sites. Decisions are guided by identified community needs, data from outreach and coordinated entry, and the goal of ensuring geographic balance and accessibility

#### Glenn County

We are currently collaborating with our Continuum of Care (CoC) partner, Habitat for Humanity, to provide Permanent Supportive Housing through a development that includes 32 units, four of which are two-bedroom. An expansion is underway to add an additional 18 units. All units, both existing and new, are filled through our local Coordinated Entry system to ensure that housing is prioritized for those with the greatest needs.

Some additional support with Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) has been successfully awarded in all three counties and specifically addressing the transitional housing needs in our community. Each counties implementation plan will differ according to their unique needs and existing infrastructure.

Glenn County is releasing an RFI to locate a provider to support possible board and care facility and each county continues efforts to add housing interventions that meet each level of housing need in our communities

#### Trinity County

The County is pursuing capital development for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units to address the severe shortage of available rentals. Current capacity for permanent housing falls short of demand. Funding from the Behavioral Health Services Act, Behavioral Health Bridge Housing programs, HHAP, and other state and federal sources will be leveraged to expand housing opportunities, reduce homelessness, and implement Housing First principles through a whole-person care approach.

#### Colusa, Glenn, Trinity Counties CoC

Each county—Colusa, Glenn, and Trinity—works directly with housing developers to secure funding for both temporary and permanent housing solutions. We actively reach out to developers of permanent supportive housing and seek their assistance in identifying and accessing the necessary financial resources.

Our goal is to connect developers with available funding opportunities, including state and federal grants, tax credits, and other financial tools. By collaborating closely with developers, we ensure that housing projects not only provide stable housing but also offer the supportive services needed for long-term success. This partnership helps streamline the funding process and increases the availability of housing for our communities.

The Continuum of Care (CoC) supports coordination between housing providers, county Behavioral Health departments, and community agencies across Colusa, Glenn, and Trinity Counties. The CoC helps ensure people experiencing homelessness or housing instability are connected to mental health, substance use, and supportive services.

Using MHSA and BHSA resources, the CoC promotes outreach, case management, and crisis response to keep clients stable and housed. We work together to share referrals, identify service gaps, and improve access to care—especially in our rural and hard-to-reach areas. Regular communication among partners helps ensure services are consistent, person-centered, and responsive to local needs.

Colusa County

As housing providers, we actively coordinate with local partners to connect individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness to a full range of services. We collaborate closely with mental health and behavioral health programs funded through the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) and Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) to ensure people can access counseling, substance use treatment, crisis intervention, and ongoing support.
