People with lived experience of homelessness, including but not limited to survivors of domestic violence.	A HHAP input session was conducted as part of a joint meeting of the CoC Leadership Council and the Coalition of Homeless Services Providers (CHSP) Board on July 16, 2025. People with lived experience have seats on both the LC and CHSP Board and participated in the discussion of HHAP 6. Additionally, 2 broadly advertised community input sessions were held on June 19 and July 21; attendees included PWLE.	People with lived experience recommended: continuing to integrate input from PWLE throughout the system; build up interventions that are effective, including Enhanced Case Management (ECM), peer support, harm reduction services, and case management that supports people to transition from being unsheltered into housing. They identified service gaps for elderly people, those with pets, and people living in cars. These stakeholders also expressed a desire to see more outreach to encampments and fewer sweeps/abatement. While HHAP 6 alone cannot integrate all these suggestions, they are either included in the Key Actions in this plan or will be integrated into the updating of the CoC's 5 Year Lead Me Home Plan.
Local department leaders and staff of qualifying smaller jurisdictions, including child welfare, public welfare, health care, behavioral health, justice, and education system leaders.	A HHAP input session was conducted as part of a joint meeting of the CoC Leadership Council and the Coalition of Homeless Services Providers (CHSP) Board on July 16, 2025. Local department leaders from CoM and SBC and representatives from cities have seats on both boards and participated in the discussion of HHAP 6.	These stakeholders recommended continuing to fund effective prevention programs like ERAP, sustaining and expanding PSH and IH, engaging smaller cities and ensuring geographic equity in investments. These stakeholders recommended continuing to fund programs that embody housing first strategies, expanding the supply of PSH and shelter available "on demand" (e.g. warming shelters). While HHAP 6 alone cannot integrate all these suggestions, they are either included in the Key Actions in this plan or will be integrated into the updating of the CoC's 5 Year Lead Me Home Plan.

Homeless Services Providers (CHSP) Board on July 16, 2025. The Central California Alliance for Health has a seat on the LC and participated in the discussion of HHAP 6.

Street medicine providers, victim service providers, and other service providers directly assisting people within the region experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.

A HHAP input session was conducted as part of a joint meeting of the CoC Leadership Council and the Coalition of Homeless Services Providers (CHSP) Board on July 16, 2025. Street medicine, victim services, and other direct service providers have seats on both boards and participated in the discussion of HHAP 6.

These stakeholders recommended increasing the availability of rental assistance/housing vouchers as well as expanding the availability of resources for single parents and families (those experience DV and those who are not). While HHAP 6 alone cannot integrate all these suggestions, they are either included in the Key Actions in this plan or will be integrated into the updating of the CoC's 5 Year Lead Me Home Plan.

Federally recognized tribal governments pursuant to Section 4103 of Title 25 of the United States Code that are within the region.

Representatives from the County of Monterey, San Benito County, and the CoC met with the CA-ICH Tribal Liaison, Vevila Blossoming Bear, to begin planning to engage tribal entities within the region. A representative from the Southern California American Indian Resource Center was invited to one of the community input sessions.

No input collected for this specific population. During the application period, all three entities met with Cal ICH Tribal Liaison, Vevila Blossoming Bear. Since we had no previous tribal engagement, we were advised to first build our relationships with our local tribes as a priority, to ensure their feedback and inclusion was not tokenized for an application process. Vevila is less familiar with tribal leaders in our area but gave us contact info for one Tribe in the region. Since our meeting, the County of Monterey and the CoC have reached out to local tribal leaders to begin relationship building.

**Documentation of Stakeholder Engagement Narrative - Stakeholder Input**

In addition to the public meetings described above, the CoC worked with the County of Monterey and San Benito County to distribute an online survey asking for input on priorities for use of HHAP 6 funding. The survey received 235 responses. Respondents ranked permanent housing as their top priority for HHAP 6 funding, followed by rapid rehousing and prevention assistance. Respondents also indicated that they thought these three intervention types would be the most impactful in reducing homelessness. The Plan includes Key Actions prioritizing all three of these intervention types.

In the general community input sessions, participants noted that there are long waits/insufficient capacity in the shelter system, particularly in the Monterey Peninsula region; as well as a need for case management and other services within shelters. The Plan incorporates Key Actions to sustain the capacity of the shelter

system.

### **Section 3. Regionally Coordinated Homelessness Action Plan**

### **3.a. Regional Partners' Roles and Responsibilities**

#### **3.a.1. Outreach and Site Coordination**

Salinas/Monterey, San Benito Counties CoC	The CoC provides funding for mobile outreach teams, leads the development of CoC-level policies on outreach and site coordination (including CoC position papers on encampments, outreach standards), and leads the coordination of outreach efforts, by convening and facilitating the CoC Outreach Coordination Committee.
Monterey County	Monterey County provides funding to conduct county-wide and

encampment-specific mobile outreach teams in coordination and collaboration with our local CoC, partners with lived experience, community service providers, cities, law enforcement entities, and multiple public agencies to provide access to services, shelter, and permanent housing to individuals experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness in the region.

San Benito County

San Benito County conducts coordinated outreach to individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness through its county-wide street outreach team, funded in part with HHAP resources. This team includes close partnerships with Behavioral Health clinicians and shelter staff to proactively engage people in encampments, public spaces, and other known locations. Together, they provide on-site assessments, crisis intervention, mental health screenings, basic needs supplies, and direct connections to shelter, interim housing, and supportive services.

The County works closely with the Continuum of Care (CoC) and local service providers to align outreach efforts with Coordinated Entry System (CES) protocols, ensuring that engagement leads to timely referrals into appropriate housing and services. Site coordination for interim, and permanent housing is informed by data from HMIS, regular interagency meetings, and case conferencing with housing navigators. This includes collaboration with Behavioral Health and local non-profits to evaluate potential sites, identify clients for referral, and streamline approval processes.

Through active participation in Continuum of Care (CoC) workgroups and policy development, the County integrates outreach, behavioral health services, and shelter operations into a unified regional strategy that prioritizes accessibility, geographic coverage, and equitable distribution of resources.

### 3.a.2. Siting and Use of Available Land

**Eligible Applicant**

**Describe how the Eligible Applicant will coordinate efforts to identify and promote use of available land for the production of interim or permanent housing in the region**

Salinas/Monterey, San Benito Counties CoC

The CoC is responsible for supporting the two counties (Monterey County, San Benito County) and the cities within the counties to coordinate and align available housing development resources, by convening a standing Housing Pipeline Committee. This committee is the venue where planning for use of available funding to maximize the creation of new units takes place.

Monterey County

County of Monterey’s (COM) 6th Cycle Housing Element includes annual affordable housing forums hosted by County Housing and Community Development Department (HCD) to connect developers, local jurisdictions, and service providers around development opportunities, funding resources, and pipeline coordination. CoM is strategically leveraging County-owned and partner-owned land to expand interim and permanent housing through interdepartmental and cross-jurisdictional partnerships.

Key projects include a planned 132 affordable units with Eden Housing and a proposed 100-unit senior housing development with the Housing Authority; a Mental Health Rehabilitation Center; Interim Inc.'s Marina Kai project with 23 permanent supportive housing units; and the proposed El Rey Motel conversion into a 40-unit Low Barrier Navigation Center in partnership with Salinas to address encampments. Additional initiatives include the SHARE Center at Laurel Yard, Soledad Interim Shelter, Casa de Noche Buena, Behavioral Health Bridge Housing, and the District 4 Safe Parking Program. These efforts demonstrate the CoM's proactive approach to utilizing underused land, forming strategic partnerships, and aligning funding to meet urgent housing and homelessness needs.

## San Benito County

San Benito County works closely with county departments, internal staff and Board of Supervisors to identify and promote land for interim and permanent housing. The County leads land use planning and affordable housing development for unincorporated areas, while also supporting county-led projects, for example, by helping secure funding for permanent supportive housing (PSH) services and programs.

The County is an active member of the Continuum of Care's (CoC) Housing Pipeline Committee, which focuses on planning future housing projects. Over the past five years, the County has taken several concrete steps:

1. A one-acre site near the San Benito County Migrant Center: A total of 16 units (5 interim housing and 11 PSH units) are currently under construction and expected to be completed by September 30, 2025.
2. A 4.66-acre property on Chappell Road: Purchased by the County and designated for low-income and homeless housing. A future housing project of 60–80 units is planned once funding is secured. The property also includes two existing homes, one nearly renovated and the other to be completed by June 30, 2026, both to be used as PSH.
3. Backside of the shelter site: In 2020, the County saw the need for transitional housing and built six units, which have been fully operational since June 2021.
4. Six-acre property off Buena Vista Road: Identified and reserved for a future housing project. Once funding is available and a nonprofit developer is secured, the County plans to develop permanent housing on the site.
5. In 2018, the Board of Supervisors identified a 2.5 acre county owned parcel for permanent housing. The board then partnered with a local non-profit developer, Community Services Development Corporation which then built 24 permanent housing units for low-income residents.

### 3.a.3. Development of Shelter, Interim and Permanent Housing Options

Salinas/Monterey, San Benito Counties CoC	<p>The CoC is responsible for analyzing the need for interim and permanent housing, providing funding to create new and continue operation of existing interim and permanent housing, and developing CoC-level policies such as emergency shelter standards (developed by the CoC Funding Committee and adopted in June 2022). The CoC also convenes the Housing Pipeline Committee (described above), which works on both affordable and permanent supportive housing. The CoC participates in a Monterey County joint meeting with the County, City of Salinas and the CoC to discuss upcoming projects and challenges arising within homeless services.</p>
Monterey County	<p>CoM collaborates with development partners using targeted and opportunistic approaches shaped by limited and varied funding sources to finance interim and permanent housing. They administer funds such as Permanent Local Housing Allocation (PLHA) for multifamily housing and shelters, program income from prior housing investments for reinvestment in affordable housing and are working to establish a Local Housing Trust Fund to create a predictable and collaborative funding environment. Despite these resources, funding remains modest and program-restricted.</p> <p>CoM partners with internal departments, the Housing Authority, and the City of Salinas to support projects serving behavioral health populations, shaping service and eligibility criteria while not directly engaging developers. CoM coordinates with the Housing Authority and local jurisdictions to leverage Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) for housing solutions, including the Days Inn conversion in King City into 45 permanent supportive units, a 16-unit interim housing facility in Soledad, and pursuing ERF for the El Rey Motel conversion into a 23-unit Low Barrier Navigation Center in Salinas to address multiple encampments within the same geographic location.</p>
San Benito County	<p>San Benito County actively works with non-profit housing developers to plan and finance both interim and permanent supportive housing. The County regularly identifies available land and partners with developers to create affordable housing options for low-income and homeless residents.</p> <p>For example, in 2018, the County partnered with Community Services Development Corporation (CSDC) to support a self-help housing project that created 24 permanent housing units. The County helped CSDC secure funding to make these homes affordable for low-income individuals. That same year, the County secured a \$1.1 million HOME grant to provide low-interest, forgivable loans to new homeowners.</p>

Earlier, in 2013, the County provided a \$1 million low-interest loan to CHISPA (Community Housing Improvement Systems and Planning Association, Inc), a non-profit developer, to help finance a 40-unit apartment complex. These projects demonstrate the County's ongoing efforts to coordinate funding and support developers in creating affordable housing.

Most recently, the County has been in discussions with DignityMoves, a non-profit housing developer, for a potential project on the County-owned Chappell Road property, which has already been set aside for low-income and homeless housing.

Through these partnerships and funding efforts, San Benito County continues to promote the development of permanent supportive housing and ensure financial resources are aligned with local housing needs.

### 3.a.4. Coordination of and Connection to Service Delivery

Salinas/Monterey, San Benito Counties CoC	<p>The CoC leads the process of designing and implementing the housing and services system to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness in Monterey and San Benito Counties, in partnership with the participating jurisdictions, cities, non-profit providers and developers and other stakeholders. The CoC does this through the convening of the Monitoring and Evaluations Committee, which ensures service delivery and connection are person-centered through a coordinated monitoring plan. Additionally, the CoC Lead Agency is working with Monterey County Behavioral Health to develop a By-Names-List of people with SMI or other mental health conditions to help expedite placement from coordinated entry.</p>
Monterey County	<p>CoM Behavioral Health Bureau (BHB) provides services for Medi-Cal members and safety-net populations with serious mental illness (SMI) and substance use disorders (SUD) through five Access Clinics and mobile crisis response teams. BHB delivers integrated services via Adult and Children's Systems of Care, partnerships with providers like Interim Inc. for outreach, ACT, crisis residential, and supportive housing, as well as SUD treatment through contracted agencies such as Sun Street Centers, Door to Hope, and CHS. Behavioral Health Bridge Housing funding supports 55 low-barrier units for up to 136 individuals and families, integrating treatment, housing navigation, and individualized plans, while Proposition 47 funds provide emergency motel vouchers for eligible unsheltered clients.</p> <p>The Department of Social Services (DSS) coordinates with BHB and other providers through the Continuum of Care, integrated case</p>

management, Coordinated Entry (CARS), and centralized waitlists to streamline access to housing and behavioral health services. Key DSS programs include CalWORKs HSP, Family Stabilization, and outreach teams targeting high-acuity individuals.

The CAO Homelessness Strategies and Initiatives Division further enhances the system by funding and coordinating encampment resolution programs, interim housing, and case management services across jurisdictions. This interdepartmental collaboration leverages shared systems and diverse funding streams to ensure a holistic, trauma-informed, and housing-first approach to homelessness in Monterey County.

**San Benito County**

San Benito County coordinates and connects individuals experiencing, or at risk of, homelessness to a full continuum of services through active participation in the Continuum of Care (CoC) governance structure. This engagement ensures the County has a central role in designing and implementing an integrated housing and service delivery system that aligns local priorities with State and federal requirements.

San Benito County leverages multiple funding streams—including MHSA (Mental Health Services Act), BHSA (Behavioral Health Subaccount), CalWORKs, child welfare, and justice-related funding—to provide tailored housing and supportive services for specialized populations. These include CalWORKs-eligible families with children, individuals with disabilities, families and children involved in the child welfare system, individuals involved in the adult welfare system, and residents eligible for specialty mental health services.

Coordination is achieved through interagency case conferencing, shared use of the Coordinated Entry System (CES) and Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), and joint planning between partner agencies in San Benito and Monterey counties. This structure ensures seamless referrals, reduced service duplication, and integrated care planning so that individuals are connected to the right mix of housing, behavioral health treatment, medical care, and supportive services needed for long-term stability.

San Benito County	No	<p>The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) has provided the County of San Benito with a letter dated April 1, 2025 confirming the substantial compliance of their Housing Element. The County Board of Supervisors adopted the Housing Element on May 20, 2025. However, to achieve full certification from HCD, we still need to complete the candidate sites' upzoning through a General Plan amendment and zoning amendment. Once these amendments are adopted by the Board, we will submit them to HCD for final review. Our current goal is to bring these amendments to the Board by December 2025. After</p>

submission, HCD’s review process will take some time, so we anticipate receiving full certification of our Housing Element in early 2026. Here is San Benito County’s timeline:

- May 20, 2025: Board of Supervisors adopted the 6th Cycle Housing Element; Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution 2025-28 to initiate a General Plan Amendment (GPA) and to concurrently amend its zoning ordinance to complete Program 3-2 (Residential High Rezone and General Plan Amendment).
- September 9, 2025: Board of Supervisors approved a Resolution for the Regional Early Action Planning Grant 2.0 to assist with the funding for the implementation of Program 3-2 (Residential High Rezone and General Plan Amendment).
- September 12, 2025: Public review period began on September 12, 2025, and ends on October 13, 2025, for the proposed Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for Program 3-2 (Residential High Rezone and General Plan Amendment).
- November 2025: Planning Commission hearing; recommendation to the Board of Supervisors on rezones and GPA.
- December 16, 2025: Board of Supervisors—first reading/intro of rezone ordinance; public hearing on GPA.
- January 13, 2026: Board of Supervisors—second reading/adoption of rezone ordinance and GPA
- Within 5 business days of adoption (by January 2026): Submit (a) Board-adopted Housing Element, (b) adoption resolutions, (c) signed rezone ordinance and GPA resolution, (d) electronic sites inventory and maps, and (e) CEQA documents and notices.

In the 5th Cycle Housing Element (2014-2023) the County completed all required programs and continues many of those programs into the 6th Cycle Housing Element (2023-2031) and the county remains compliance towards our Housing Element programs. Our 6th Cycle Housing Element has updated the timeline for many programs so if they have not been implemented yet, they will be implemented within the timeline provided in Chapter 6 Policy Plan of the Housing Element. The only caveat is Program 3-2 Residential High Rezone and General Plan Amendment to rezone the 12 Housing Element parcels. This must be completed by December 2025. Staff are currently working on this with our consultants, and we have completed the timeline for AB 52 consultation, and we are waiting for the SB 18 review window to end. Staff are on track to complete this by December 2025.

The County is not eligible for a Pro Housing Designation as of December 2025. A certified Housing Element and a resolution approved by the Board are pre-requisites to becoming eligible for this designation. Additionally, the County would need at least 30 points in the Pro Housing Designation scoring. A rough estimate shows that we may score as high as 26 points under our current policies and programs. With implementation of the Housing Element programs (following its adoption) we will meet the minimum points threshold. The County intends to pursue the Pro Housing Designation before the end of the 2026 calendar year.

San Benito County

Does not plan to apply for Prohousing Designation

The County has not received pro housing designation, has not applied, and does not plan to apply. While it is not necessary to be an urban community to receive pro housing designation, it is more productive when you have access to public infrastructure such as sewer and water. As the County is not a public water purveyor and relies on the City of Hollister for the density of housing development that would require sewer and water, we are not seeking pro housing designation at this time. San Benito County currently has the following pro-housing policies: inclusionary ordinance; local tenant preference ordinance; multiple RM designations in the general plan which allow a density of up to 20 units per acre; San Benito County is also in the process of rezoning 12 parcels totaling approximately 100 acres into High Density Residential with a designation of 20 to 45 dwelling units per acre.
