Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1a - Begin Answer The City of Riverside uses several data collection methods to determine gaps analysis, the first one is Coordinated Entry System that lists homeless individuals living on the streets or in a shelter waiting for a match to housing. We also utilize HMIS annual performance reports for the Emergency Shelter bed utilization. In addition we collaborate with the Riverside County and Continuum of Care in the annual Point in Time Count to understand the subpopulation service gaps. We have a internal contract with Outreach Grid to understand gaps in critical outreach services. Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1a - End Answer

b. How people with lived experience of homelessness had ongoing meaningful and purposeful opportunities to participate in and inform the most recent gaps assessment and how they have meaningful opportunities to inform all levels of system planning over time;

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1b - Begin Answer The City of Riverside actively collaborates with the Continuum of Care who has designated a lived experience transitional aged youth to represent a youth seat for the Board of Governance which is responsible for producing policies that impact services. On a more local level the City of Riverside has established the Homeless Service Campus on Hulen Place which is a campus of services from Access Center to Emergency Shelter, Bridge Housing and Permanent Supportive Housing. Within the Homeless Service Campus, the City will be integrating a lived experience person to provide input on programs and services.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1b - End Answer

c. How organizations that have historically served communities of color but may not have previously participated formally in the CoC and may not be a part of the homelessness provider community had meaningful and purposeful opportunities to participate in and inform the most recent gaps assessment and how they will be engaged in system planning over time;

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1c - Begin Answer The City of Riverside Office of Homeless Solutions plans to engage in conversations with the local chapter Inland Empire NAACP to integrate racial equity in gap assessments. We will also collaborate with the Center for Social Justice and Civil Liberties Union in conducting a needs assessment on how to better serve communities of color within the homeless realm.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1c - End Answer

d. How gaps were assessed for special populations such as families, youth, victims of domestic violence, seniors, persons who have been convicted of a crime, persons with a disability, persons who are chronically homeless, persons with HIV/AIDS, persons who are LGBTQ, veterans, persons with limited English proficiency, and persons who are undocumented;

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1d - Begin Answer We utilized our 2020 Point in Time Count to determine gaps in subpopulations. The City's homeless point in time count of 587 reported 11% were veterans, 38% were identified as chronically homeless, 30% reported mental health conditions, 27% reported substance abuse, 23% reported PTSD, 24% reported physical disability, 12% reported developmental disability, and 12% reported brain injury. We plan to utilize additional surveys to address the need of undocumented individuals and LGBTQ within the community. We will seek assistance from organizations such as TruEvolution, Catholic

Charities, Riverside Latino Network, and Inland Coalition for Immigration Justice.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1e - Begin Answer The City of Riverside has taken a proactive approach to addressing racial disparities by declaring racism as a public health crisis in 2020, through a City Council approved an anti-racism vision, and the creation of the Office of Sustainability committed to addressing diversity, equity and inclusivity. The Office of Homeless Solutions will be integrating these three pillars of racial equity into the daily operations of homeless programs and services.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 1h - Begin Answer The City of Riverside will create a survey of the programs funded through HHAP-2 and provide to the homeless population with a rubric of critical needs within the homeless delivery system. The City will also review program's quarterly reports to ensure that HHAP-2 grant funds are resolving the identified gaps by the homeless population.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2a - Begin Answer According to the 2020 Homeless PIT Count, the City of Riverside has 587 unsheltered homeless individuals, which 49% are White, 20% are Black, 26% unknown race, 1% Asian, and 1% American Indian and 23% Hispanic. Of the unsheltered homeless population, sixty-one (61) are males and 26% are females and 13% were unknown and 71% were under the age of 24, 11% were between the age of 18-24 and 2% were under 18. The City is seeing an increase of seniors experiencing homelessness. Based on the Coordinated Entry System, the City of Riverside has 76 homeless individuals in need of Permanent Supportive Housing, 29 in need of Rapid Re-Housing and 9 in need of affordable housing. In the city of Riverside there are 215 shelter beds to provide interim housing, 16 dedicated permanent supportive housing units and an ongoing rental assistance program that is funded with federal HOME Investment Partnerships Program and Emergency Solutions Grant funds. The case management is funded through Measure Z, a local tax initiative. The City also operates the Riverside Access Center and Homeless Street Outreach Program to connect homeless individuals to families through diversion or to shelter programs. The Riverside Access Center also assists with transportation, connection to employment opportunities, health benefits, and life skills. Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2a - End Answer

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2b - Begin Answer The City of Riverside will be collecting this information on individuals who have touched the criminal justice system, persons with a disability, persons who are chronically homeless, persons with HIV/AIDS, persons who are LGBTQ, veterans, persons with limited English proficiency, and persons who are undocumented.

Riverside will collaborate with law enforcement, probation, Foothill AIDS, TruEvolution, Office of Aging, and Loma Linda Veterans.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2b - End Answer

 Data and qualitative information showing any racial or ethnic disparities in access to services, delivery of services and housing placement and housing retention outcomes of homeless services;

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2c - Begin Answer According to the Stella report, there is a racial/ethnic disparity between White, Non-Hispanic and Hispanic versus Black or African American or other minorities. For example, 45% of White, Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino had access to Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) while only 27% of Black or African American had access to PSH and 31% of White, Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino had exited into PSH while only 23% of Black or African American individuals exited into PSH.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2c - End Answer

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2d - Begin Answer Not at this moment. The City will request subrecipients to provide performance outcomes data that breaks the data down by race and ethnicity as Stella data only provides the data by the continuum of care area.

Homelessness Response System Gaps Question 2e - Begin Answer The Year Round Emergency Shelter in the city of Riverside served 661 clients in FY 2019/20 of which only 35% of the clients are form

the City. Due to the disproportionate number of individuals seeking shelter beds in the City of Riverside that are not Riverside residents there is a gap in shelter beds and services for Riverside residents. The gap in Homeless Prevention will be addressed using the anticipated \$9 million of Emergency Rental Assistance grant funds the City anticipates receiving from the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

One of the areas of the local homeless response system that has gaps in resources is Outreach and shelter and permanent housing services for the homeless population in the Santa Ana River bottom. The Outreach funds identified in HHAP 1 will alleviate this gap in the system. The City also has 229 permanent supportive housing program units in the pipeline for development.

The City of Riverside fully supports the TruEvolutions transitional housing project that will serve Project Roomkey residents. The County of Riverside is launching three Homekey projects consisting of 161 units to house the Project Roomkey residents. The City's HHAP2 funding will be used to help the homeless living on these streets.

Transitional age youth over the age of 18 can access the City's adult system through the Access Center at the Homeless Service Campus and Pallet Shelter. HHAP2 funding for youth will help maximize outreach, housing assistance, supportive services and collaboration with the County and Continuum of Care. The City will also be working in collaboration with the foster care system to help individuals aging out of the foster care system. The City will continue to work closely with Operation Safehouse, a youth shelter operator. The City will be releasing a Request for Proposals for a youth service provider to increase the level of services in the City. HHAP-2 Funding Plans Question 4 - End Answer

The City's Santa Ana Riverbottom was to reach out to the homeless living the riverbottom and connect them to shelter and housing. Due to the number of individuals in the riverbottom and the services needed to address their critical needs, the City is proposing to allocate HHAP 2 towards services coordination and rapid rehousing.

HHAP-2 Goal Question 1 - Begin Answer

With HHAP2, the City will address the racial disparity among Black/African Americans entering the shelter and exiting into housing through Outreach and Rental Assistance Programs. The City will earmark at least 5% of administrative funds to procure racial equity experts to provide training and life skills classes to at least 10 staff members at all levels homeless response system.

The City is providing an equitable opportunity to procure an expert youth provider to execute best practices for youth services rental assistance program coupled with and case management. The City will utilize 8% of the youth set aside funds, approximately \$261,030.32 to provide rental assistance funds coupled with ongoing case management and supportive services to at least 10-15 youth and ensure diversity and equity programs are integrated in services.

Unfortunately, the barriers experienced was lack in overall funding as the plan was not approved by the City Council. Another barriers in working with County and Regional partners includes the overall commitment, time, and response to fund City projects that impact surrounding jurisdictions such as the Santa Ana River bottom.

The funding will also allow the City to expand youth providers in the City that can focus on housing solutions.

services for retention services. The City has set aside outreach and case
management services to support the regional need of the CoC and County,
given the surrounding jurisdictions of the Santa Ana Riverbottom borders.
The methodology for determining the regional need is reviewing staff
capacity for outreach, shelter bed utilization and hard to serve homeless
population with mental health and drug addiction barriers.
The City of Riverside is a high services area given the County's jail, mental
health, substance abuse, family justice center and countywide shelter. As
such, the City will work with the County to determine the identified
population from the City and other jurisdictions to determine which part of

the regional need our respective funding allocations will be. This will be done in the following ways:

- 1. A targeted effort Santa Ana River bottom encampment response task force. The County & CoC and City of Riverside have already begun meeting consecutively to discuss and plan on the encampment response to the Santa Ana River bottom (SAR). To determine which part of the regional need our respective funding allocations will be, we are convening to review maps and geographic borders on respective areas through aerial drones and designating identified areas of outreach commitments. To determine which part of the regional need our respective funding allocations will be, we are also collectively creating an inventory of all outreach agencies, provider partners, stakeholders to identify resources benefiting the collective project. To determine which part of the regional need our respective funding allocations will be, we are also designated specific leadership to specific targeted goals concerning the homeless response, per jurisdiction. Lastly, to determine which part of the regional need our respective funding allocations will be, we have collectively curated a timeline for collective response by outreach teams that have been historically split in a Team A and Team B. In <u>addition</u>
- 2. Most importantly to determine which part of the regional need on how the County, CoC and City will respond to respective areas concerning this project and respective funding, is a collective point in time county, or demographic survey with all outreach teams to review numbers of individuals who have identified their last known location and place of origin, along with subpopulation data that support allocations of shelter and resource such as (youth, adults, chronic homeless population, veterans, HIV HOPWA population and more).
- 3. Finally, regional work will be modeled by the work that the County and CoC and City participated and successfully produced collective successful outcomes such as the Governors 100 Day Challenge to address Senior homelessness with the ambitious goal of linking 140 seniors to permanent housing. In addition, successful regional work was completed with the Project Room Key by City, CoC and County determining clients residing in their jurisdictions and providing collective support through regular case conferencing.

The City will link bridge housing residents to rental assistance programs funded through the City's Emergency Solutions Grant and HOME Investment Partnerships Program.
