Question 1

A demonstration of how the jurisdiction has coordinated, and will continue to coordinate, with other jurisdictions, including the specific role of each applicant in relation to other applicants in the region.

Question 1 Response

In 2017 the Nevada County Board of Supervisors made addressing homelessness a top priority, directing staff to develop initiatives and incorporate homelessness in fiscal planning and management of County operations. Since then, County staff, alongside the regional Continuum of Care (CoC) comprised of nonprofits and community stakeholders, have made significant strides in coordinating a broad-based response to homelessness. These efforts are coordinated by the County and the CoC, providing a strategic, joint approach towards local homelessness response. Homelessness touches many systems and presents social, political, economic, and environmental challenges that can only be addressed through a strong collaborative approach.

Question 2

Question 2 Response

Nevada County's HOME Team combines Nevada County Behavioral Health with local partner Hospitality House to provide case management and engagement with a medical nurse. The team engages individuals where they are at, whether it is in camps or on the street, and coordinates with Nevada County Sherriff when needed. Nevada County Behavioral Health also partners with the Nevada County Sheriff through the Mobile Crisis Unit to provide resources and care to people experiencing behavioral health crisis episodes. The team connects individuals to mental health professionals and identifies options to stabilize, including hospitalization. Adding resources for homeless, mental health, and substance use response to law enforcement increases positive outcomes for individuals needing additional support and provides law enforcement with additional options for response. Nevada County has also implemented the Housing Resource Team, which is a collaborative case management team with 26 partners that includes Social Services, Behavioral Health, and local non-profits to address homelessness for three groups: veterans, families and transitional age youth, and chronically homeless. The team works from the By-Name list to identify resources and supports for the best navigation strategy for the individual. Additionally, Nevada County has worked to provide mental health and substance use disorder assessments and facilitate

discharge planning in the jail, increase wraparound services for foster youth or youth at risk of entering foster care, and integrated client services for those at risk of homelessness with CalWORKS through collaboration with community partners to strengthen the Family Stabilization program. Incorporating as many providers and services as possible into the homeless response system increases the potential for success for those at risk.

Question 3

A description of specific actions the applicant will take to ensure racial and gender equity in service delivery, housing placements, and housing retention and changes to procurement or other means of affirming racial and ethnic groups that are overrepresented among residents experiencing homelessness have equitable access to housing and services.

Question 3 Response

Overall, racial disparities exist among different demographic groups and their access to services and, for that reason, service outcome for these groups must improve. This improvement is the responsibility of the County and the CoC and it begins by better connecting to communities disproportionately affected by homelessness.

A key place to start is to ensure the system wide collection of demographic data. State HDIS data indicated that 37% of demographic data in the Coordinated Entry System is "unknown" or "uncollected." This means the disparities could be more pronounced than the data suggests. Improved data quality will ensure that Nevada County can accurately determine and maintain proportionality between services accessed by specific subpopulations.

It is important to note that Nevada County's population is 85% white. Percentages of other races is low, which means that actual numbers are low for counts of individuals reporting other races or ethnicities. When working to establish trackable goals, percentages can fluctuate dramatically by an increase or decrease of just one person. These small numbers make it more difficult to identify disparities among certain groups, but that does not mean that disparities don't exist. In fact, disparities among groups that lack established local communities may be even more significant and more difficult to address.

Question 4

A description of how the applicant will make progress in preventing exits to homelessness from institutional settings, including plans to leverage funding from mainstream systems for evidence-based housing and housing-based solutions to homelessness.

Question 4 Response

At the root of the homelessness problem is a lack of housing options for all people at risk of or currently homeless and those exiting from institutional settings have additional needs that can make placement into housing even more difficult. Nevada County includes expansion of supporting housing units as a strategy for preventing exits to homelessness. With housing placement options comes the need for housing supports and case management, and Nevada County has received funding to implement the Housing Support Team, a cross system post-housing team established to support current permanent supportive housing residents as well as households in the recovery residence system. The team will provide individuals in recovery residences with linkages to housing navigation and support as well as post-housing services to ensure success with housing placement. Additionally, Nevada County is working to prevent homelessness for people involved with Nevada County Behavioral Health through increasing mental health services for foster youth, increasing the number of children aged 0-5 receiving behavioral health services. particularly those involved with Child Welfare Services, and by implementing an early psychosis program with UC Davis, funded through the Mental Health Oversight and Accountability Commission, connecting the justice system to HMIS, the coordinated entry system, and the Housing Resource Team meetings, collaborating with the justice system to develop a referral and diversion process for individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness in the justice settings, and utilizing the Housing Resource Team, compiled of 26 partners collaborating on housing placement. These key programs ensure that those exiting the homeless system from institutional settings, including hospitalization or jails, gain the services and case management needed to be successful in housing placements.

Question 5

Specific and quantifiable systems improvements that the applicant will take to improve the delivery of housing and services to people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including, but not limited to, the following:

- (I) Capacity building and workforce development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building the capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services.
- (II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System.
- (III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.
- (IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.
- (V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youthspecific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

Question 5 Response

Nevada and the local Continuum of Care have joined Built for Zero, a nationwide campaign of over 80 communities who are pioneering changes in how communities use data and collaboration to tackle

homelessness. The County and the CoC are working closely with Built for Zero staff to track all elements of the local Homeless Action Plan and to make available an easy-to-understand online portal for stakeholders to access and see the plan's progress. Data will be tracked monthly through seven key data points:

- 1. Inflow (newly identified): Individuals and families who have entered the homeless system for the first time
- 2. Inflow (returned from housing): individuals and families who were housed but lost that housing and have returned to homelessness
- 3. Inflow (Returned from inactive): individuals and families who were moved to "inactive status" but have now reentered the system
- 4. Actively Homeless: Everyone on the current By-Name list and/or identified through outreach and engagement as in the process of being assessed and included on the By-Name list.
- 5. Outflow (Housing Placements): the number of individuals and families exiting the homeless system to housing.
- 6. Outflow (moved to inactive): individuals and families who have not been located by outreach, received a service by any provider or have not sheltered in over 90 days.
- 7. Outflow (no longer meets population criteria): individuals whose current status changes in ways that remove them from the active list. Examples included entering institutions for long periods of time, reunification with families, or other situations that resolve their homelessness.

Through efforts with Built for Zero, Nevada County will better understand outcomes related to homelessness efforts and can continue to refine data entry and coordination for HMIS for improved overall data quality.

Through coordination with partners, the county conducted the first ever Point in Time count for youth in 2022 and was able to reach a larger population of homeless youth to better understand the needs of the youth homeless population of the County.

Question 6

Evidence of connection with the local homeless Coordinated Entry System.

Question 6 Response

In 2018, Nevada County and the CoC implemented a HUD-mandated Coordinated Entry System (CES). Referred to as the "no-wrong door" approach, the CES is designed to streamline access and entry into homeless services such as shelter and domestic violence programs. In Nevada County, households experiencing homelessness can enter the CES at any homeless service location or by simply calling 2-1-1 to be assessed and referred over the phone. Coordinated entry is utilized by participating homeless providers in the County to streamline matching people experiencing homelessness with available resources. Dedicated funding to support data collection is a key gap. The Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and Coordinated Entry System (CES) are required tools for tracking client level information and outcomes for the homeless system. Agencies receiving federal and state funds for homeless initiatives are required to pay yearly to have access to the system and the administration of both HMIS and CES cost money. To have the system we need to track the outcomes we want will require significant ongoing investment and is an area the county intends to utilize HHAP funding.

Explanation of How the Proposed Use of Funds Will Complement Existing local, state, and federal funds and equitably close the gaps identified in the Local Landscape Analysis

HHAP 3 funds will be "backbone" funding for a variety of strategic priorities. This means it will join local, state, and federal funding sources to ensure that priority programs and new programs identified in the plan will have the necessary funds to be effective over the next two years.

Rental Assistance funds (300,000) will join COC Competition RRH funds, HSP funds earmarked for rental assistance and HDAP funds to support clients engaged through the centralized landlord liaison program in paying costs associated with lease up and ongoing, as needed support to maintain housing. Operating subsidies for both existing shelter and service enriched housing (400,000) will join County general fund, MHSA and COC ESG funds to support low barrier access to shelter and expansion of the existing permanent supportive housing projects. System support for Coordinated Entry and HMIS (\$75,000) will join COC Competition planning funds to support improvements and expansion of Coordinated Entry and assist county agencies in HMIS license costs. Prevention and diversion funds will join family stabilization funds and general funds to stand up a new flexible rental assistance program aimed at preventing households from entering homelessness. \$200,000 will be dedicated to continuing support for existing non-congregate shelter operations and will join MHSA, Homekey, ARP and general fund to maintain expanded capacity realized through expanded funding for shelter from the Covid funding. \$45,000 will join MHSA funds to support increased use of master leasing to expand PSH sites.

Describe plan to connect residents to permanent housing.	
Nevada County has embraced a Navigation Strategy that maps each client's journey through the system and into permanent housing. The HEART of the strategy is the Housing Resource Team. The HRT is comprised of 26 providers divided over 3 subpopulations: Chronic, Families and TAY, Veterans. The HRT for each of these subpopulations meet weekly and utilize the coordinated entry system-by name list to coordinated service delivery across multiple systems. The first step is assessing each clients housing needs. The second step is to match them to the correct housing program based on eligibility and the third step to move them into navigation. At that third step, each household is offered interim non-congregate shelter to ensure wrap around services in a fixed location while housing navigators work to secure a permanent unit.
