Question 1

A demonstration of how the jurisdiction has coordinated, and will continue to coordinate, with other jurisdictions, including the specific role of each applicant in relation to other applicants in the region.

Question 1 Response

Trinity County is part of the Dos Rios Continuum of Care, a 3-county CoC. The other two counties, Colusa and Glenn are over 2 hours away and we coordinate funding across the region and share the same HMIS system. Glenn County is the lead for the CoC, and retains all CoC administered grant administration funds for its efforts.

Trinity County established their own housing department about 2 years ago to address the needs of its residents not being addresses by the CoC lead as the entity was two hours away and couldn't realistically provide services in our county related to emergency services, outreach or intensive case management. Since starting the county housing programs, we have established a comprehensive and fully engaged crisis response team, inclusive of the county's hospital and medical clinics, BHS, HHS, probation/law enforcement and the domestic violence services providers, local churches and food banks and elected officials. With respect to service provision, we are self-reliant and coordinate only funding, applications and HMIS/CES with the CoC partners.

Question 2 Response

Trinity County has an engaged and responsive crisis response team that includes adult protective services, child welfare services, mainstream resources, food bank services, WIC/PH services, Partnership Health (MCP), BHS, Victim Witness, probation/law enforcement, formerly homeless staff, SMART center (employment and workforce programs), Veteran's services, and medical health providers.

Funding through HHAP 3 will increase the capacity of the crisis response system by adding beds to our housing inventory count for the target population. Often our program participants have barriers to housing that need to be remedied before long-term housing is possible; therefore, by improving the number of beds we have "at our disposal" will ensure that we have the capacity to move persons from the street into a

program where they will have access to the services that will improve their overall outcomes and long-term housing stability.

Question 3

Question 4

Question 4 Response

The crisis response team in Trinity County meets on a regular basis to discuss service needs of program participants who have entered the housing system, including the resources available to meet the program participants needs. The Housing Manager coordinates and collaborates services for persons exiting the hospital or jail as those are the only institutional settings in our county. The client-centered approach is followed unless the program participant has a court order or program requirement for participation in a housing program.

The primary referral for any program participant is to mainstream resources and once eligibility is established, then secondary and other service referrals occur. Due to the lack of providers across the

county, the participants on the crisis response team are the only providers in the county, so it makes cross coordination, collaboration and the braided use of mainstream resources easy to activate.

The complex needs of frequent utilizers of public services, which tends to be persons who experience chronic homelessness, really require a direct service approach that is embedded in the larger system of care. Trinity County utilizes the crisis response team, which is made up of all mainstream systems, as well some private systems of care, to provide an array of wrap-around services necessary to prevent exits to homelessness.

Question 5

Specific and quantifiable systems improvements that the applicant will take to improve the delivery of housing and services to people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including, but not limited to, the following:

- (I) Capacity building and workforce development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building the capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services.
- (II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System.
- (III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.
- (IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.
- (V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youthspecific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

Question 5 Response

- 1. Build the capacity to serve by recruiting and hiring up to 3 additional staff, including an outreach coordinator, housing navigator and case manager; this effort will also improve data quality through the HMIS system, and will increase the number of individuals who can lead the point in time count
- 2. Coordinate efforts for housing referrals and placement with the Nor El Muk tribe for participants who may be indigenous or have culturally specific needs
- 3. Participate in discussions with the CoC lead about adopting a new CES assessment tool

Question 6 Response

The Trinity County Housing Department is the primary access point to the homelessness response system and crisis response system in Trinity County. As the County's lead entity, the Trinity County Housing Department is the entity that is responsible for HMIS/CES data integrity and for establishing local protocols, practices, releases of information, and for managing the by-name list. The Trinity County Housing Department coordinates and facilitates the regular Coordinated Entry meetings where we discuss the crisis response system, gaps in services, available resources and discuss the by-name list and how best to meet the needs of the participants we are serving.

The County does not have an emergency shelter and it is extremely costly to place the target population in motels, not to mention the lack of available motels. Most chronically homeless persons are not ready to go from the street to a long term housing situation and need time to build trust while in non-congregate sheltering situations. Establishing a non-congregate shelter in Trinity County would give program participants the opportunity to be safe in a shelter, in a room by themself, while they build trust and work on any barriers that they wish to. Trinity County's chronically homeless population have significant challenges to being housed, including untreated behavioral health and physical health conditions which would prevent them from living alone or without some sort of support or ongoing care. These conditions can be treated in an environment where supportive services are available daily. Once health conditions or circumstances approve and participants opt for longer term housing, the housing navigator would work to establish opportunities for placement.
