By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the Kings Tulare Homelss Alliance will show [4197.6] total people accessing services who are experiencing homelessness annually, representing [381.6] [more] people and a [10%] [increase] from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate to see 381.6 more people experience homelessness in Kings and Tulare Counties, which is an overall 10% increase. This is a ""flattening the curve"" goal, so while the trend will continue to increase, we hope to slow the growth. In our HHAP-3 application we targeted a 14% increase, and this round we further anticipate a reduction in the increase from 14% to 10% due to housing projects currently under development. Part of the driver of the increase is the end of pandemic response programs such as the Evication Moratorium, rental assistance programs, the end of FEMA reimbursement and Project Roomkey. We also anticipate the number of individuals experiencing homelessness to increase at a faster rate based upon historical PIT data but part of that increase will be offset by an increase in housing resources."

Goal Narrative

We anticipate to see 164.6 more people experience homelessness on a daily basis in Kings and Tulare counties, which is an overall 20% increase from the 2022 PIT or roughly similar to the 2020 PIT count of 973 people. Over the last few years we have seen rapid fluctuations in number of individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness (2018 = 650, 2019 = 775, 2020 = 973, and 2022 = 823. We anticipate an overall increase in the number of people experiencing homelessness on a daily basis due to increasingy harsh economic conditions and the phase-out of pandemic-era programs and funding such as Project Roomkey. This is a ""flattening the curve"" goal, so while the trend will continue to increase, we hope to slow the growth. "

"Goal Narrative:

We anticipate to see 232.65 more people experience homelessness for the first time in Kings and Tulare Counties, which is a 11% increase from the baseline data. Of note, in the baseline data there is 3,816 people experiencing homelessness while there is 2,115 or 55.42% of the homeless population experienced homelessness for the first time. System inflow/outflow projections indicate people will enter homelessness at a faster rate than housing resouces become available due to the end of pandemic era supports and a worsening economy. "

Goal Narrative

We forecast there will be a one-time lumpsum shift in our unhoused population into permanent housing due to 1 Homekey site in Kings County and 1 site in Tulare County opening and an additional Homekey project coming online in 2023. After these one-time transfers we expect that the increasing numbers of people entering into homelessness will outstrip the available housing inventory and lead to a net reduction in people exiting homelessness into permanent housing.

We anticipate to see the length of time persons experience homelessness increase from the baseline data. We anticipate this change as although we are increasing the available housing resources, the number of people entering homelessness and the associated length of time they are homeless is anticipated to continue to grow as housing inventory is incredibly limited, competition is high, and pandemic-era funding will be exhausted. We also anticipate growing challenges with landlord enagement due to the high

competition for the limited housing stock."

Goal Narrative

We don't have adequate funding necessary to provide case management to assist individuals with high acuity to remain in permanent housing. Due to the design of the Coordinated Entry System prioritizing high need individuals, especially through Homekey, we anticipate a net increase in the amount of people existing permanent housing back to homelessness. Due to high housing competition, we anticipate a high number of evictions as landlords are likely to pursue evictions more often, more rapidily, and for minor

infractions."

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a mixed outcome in this area. Our forecasts indicate the overall number of people entering homeless will increase, and the overall housing inventory will increase, so we anticipate a one-time increase in successful placements followed by a reduction in successful placements. Overall, the inflow of people entering homelessness will increase at a higher rate than the number of people being successfully placed, so we'll see an increase in the numbers of people being placed but a reduction in the percentage of people being housed. We have an increasing number of outreach workers but a limited housing inventory.

"1. Utilize the increase in vouchers and rental assistance (Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF), Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHV), and Mainstream Vouchers (MVP)) in partnership with the anticipated new units (Project Homekey, Finca Serena, etc.) to exit people from homelessness into

permanent housing at a faster rate than was previously possible because landlords won't have to be identified and incentivised.

- 2. Utlize new funding sources to increase the number of outreach staff working with people experiencing homelessness. The ERF funding will increase the number of outreach staff making contact with people experiencing homelessness and working to get those individuals document ready for housing by 3 full time staff members. We have also utlizied MVP funding to hire a Housing Placement Specialist who will work with clients who do not have case management on unit applications, Housing Authority paperwork, etc. We anticipate these new staffing positions will decrease the length of time people will experience homelessness.
- 3. HHAP 3 funds will be used to support ongoing projects' staffing needs at interim housing projects including two Case Managers, one Program Managers, one Program Director, and one Client Services Provider. These staff members will work directly with people experiencing homelessness who are utilizing the program services to decrease the length of time people remain unhoused.
- 4. Reinstate drop-in events that were previously paused due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Local Intiatives Nativgation Centers (LINC) are drop-in events in our major cities that connect people experiencing homelessness with multiple resources and service providers in one centralized location. Services offered at LINC events include housing assistance and counceling, mental health services, alcohol and drug counceling, county benefits advocacy, and shelter placement. These events will be widely advertised to people experiencing homelessness via street outreach staff. Flyers in both English and Spanish will be posted in locations where people experiencing homelessness tend to congregate including food distribution sites, libraries, warming/cooling centers, etc.
- 5. Engage the tribal communities in Kings and Tulare Counties including inviting them to be members of the CoC (waive membership fee if necessary), inviting them to have representation on the Tulare County Homeless Taskforce and the Kings County Homeless Collaborative, and engage in ongoing conversations about reducing Native American/Alaskan Native homelessness.
- 6. Work with local tribes to learn about what housing options are available for Native Americans and Alaska Natives who are experiencing homelessness and refer clients who identify as Native American and Alaska Natives to their respective tribes as soon as possible. Work with each individual to identify the best course of action based on their desired housing location and specific wants and needs.
- 7. Work with the tribal communities in Kings and Tulare Counties to ensure that all outreach materials are presented in a way that is clear and easily understood by Native American individuals who are experiencing homelessness. This can include, but is not limited to, taking into consideration concepts like writte/spoken language, literacy, etc."

This partnership is being actively developed at the time of this HHAP 4 application and should leverage other grants and HHAP 4 set aside dollars.

Additionally, we seek out training such as the Culture of Poverty Experience (COPE), to enhance our cultural humility and responsiveness. The Kings Tulare Homeless Alliance has hosted and will continue to host conversations on equity during membership meetings. Modifying our procurement process for service providers is far beyond the scope or authority of our homeless efforts to influence.

(II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System. This is one of the funding priorities addressed in our Managed Care Plans' HHIP

(III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.

The Kings County Human Services Agency is a member of the Kings County Homeless Collaborative and coordinates with numerous community providers to enhance access to services, identify needs and braid funds wherever programmatic goals align

(IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.

The Kings Tulare Homeless Alliance actively seeks to expand the number of organizations and volunteers who assist with PIT efforts

(V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youth-specific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

Through our collaboration with the Child Welfare department in Kings County, we are reviewing our referral process for the foster youth who are "aging out" (those aged 18-24) who are at risk or experiencing homelessness. Goal Narrative

We anticipate to see 381.6 more people experience homelessness in Kings and Tulare Counties, which is an overall 10% increase. This is a "flattening the curve" goal, so while the trend will continue to increase, we hope to slow the growth. In our HHAP-3 application we targeted a 14% increase, and this round we further anticipate a reduction in the increase from 14% to 10% due to housing projects currently under development. Part of the driver of the increase is the end of pandemic response programs such as the Evication Moratorium, rental assistance programs, the end of FEMA reimbursement and Project Roomkey. We also anticipate the number of individuals experiencing homelessness to increase at a faster rate based upon historical PIT data but part of that increase will be offset by an increase in housing resources.
