Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the [CA-521 Davis, Woodland/Yolo County CoC] will show [1,386] total people accessing services who are experiencing homelessness annually, representing [28] [fewer] people and a [2%] [reduction] from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

From CY 20 to 21, we experienced a greater than 10% decline in number of people served. However, looking towards 2025, we anticipate a smaller reduction in the number of persons experiencing homelessness due to a likely increase in economic stress, such as inflation, unemployment, and rent increases.

We will continue to focus on the two cohort groups that require attention are Black/African American/African and American Indian/Indigenous. The updated CY 21 baseline data shows that we have made no progress (actually 1% worse for each population). We will continue to focus our efforts to reduce this disparity regarding over-representation.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

Decrease the number of Black/African American/African individuals to no more than 15% and Indian/Indigenous individuals to 3.5% of the total number of people experiencing homelessness.

1b. Reducing the number of persons experiencing homelessness on a daily basis

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, data for the [CA-521 Davis, Woodland/Yolo County CoC] will show [359] total people experiencing unsheltered homelessness daily, representing [19] [fewer] people and a [5%] [reduction] from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

2022 PIT data may be uncommonly high due to Covid-19. While impact of Covid may be declining, increasing economic stressors (inflation) may drive homelessness even higher regardless of efforts to prevent or shelter.

From CY 20 to 21, we experienced a 25% decline in number of persons who became newly homeless. However, looking towards 2025, we anticipate a smaller reduction in the number of persons newly homelessness.

CY 21 baseline data for CA-521 Davis, Woodland/Yolo County CoC, Measure 7 shows an increase from 11% to 19% for those suffering from mental illness, and an increase from 2% to 7% for victims of domestic violence.

We will increase efforts to provide equitable services to these two subpopulations to keep outcome measures on target.

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the [CA-521 Davis, Woodland/Yolo County CoC] will show [257] total people exiting homelessness into permanent housing annually, representing [0] [more] people and a [0%] [increase] from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

From CY 20 to 21 we experienced 345 fewer persons exiting to permanent housing. During the first year of the pandemic there was significant effort to connect people to permanent housing, including reuniting with relatives and friends. This result did not materialize in 2022 where we connected only 257 persons to permanent housing. We anticipate the number to remain at the 257 level.

This number increased from 129 days to 157 days. VERY few housing options exist for individuals with or without vouchers.

Persons over the age of 55 experienced even more days homelessness, from 315 (FFY19/20) to 334 days (FFY20/21). According to the CY 21 baseline report, the average length of time homeless for all populations increased from 129 (previous year) to 157.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

5% decrease in number of days homeless for people over 55. This would reduce the average day for individuals over the age of 55 to 317.

Yolo County HHSA is currently working with Partnership HealthPlan of California, our managed care plan on establishing our HHIP data sharing agreement. HHSA also has agreements/partnerships with our hospitals located within our jurisdiction to fund a mobile medicine team that provides physical and behavioral health care. HHSA also directly provides or oversees all the contracted services for specialty mental health services to the SMI population and the Drug MediCal substance use disorder contractors.

facilitated at its early stage by an outside technical assistance group. Additionally, the Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to support the formation of Yolo Youth Commission comprised of 15 youth from throughout the County and the effort is being led by the Yolo County Office of Education. The CoC and County will ensure coordination/collaboration with this group to make sure efforts are maximized and not duplicated.

HHSA also has agreements/partnerships with the hospitals located within our jurisdiction to fund a mobile medicine team that provides physical and behavioral health care. We also have an internal homeless coordination/case management team who in coordination with the mobile medicine team provide care and case management to those being discharged from the local hospitals. HHSA has 3 members on the Community Corrections Partnership (CCP) which has increased funding the past several years for re-entry from jail to minimize any exits from incarceration to homelessness and has partnered with a local provider to increase substance use recovery residences set to expand from 20 beds to 50 beds in December 2022

which will greatly reduce exists to homelessness from incarceration.

(I) Capacity building and workforce development for service providers within the jurisdiction, including removing barriers to contracting with culturally specific service providers and building the capacity of providers to administer culturally specific services.

Internally, HHSA has a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion workgroup tasked with training HHSA staff on cultural competency. Externally, with a reserved seat on the CoC HHSA has been a part of the CoC creation and adopton of a the CoC policy on racial equity and diversion and HHSA will be a part of the CoC subcommittee that will develop an actionable plan to address disparities in the Yolo County homelessness system.

(II) Strengthening the data quality of the recipient's Homeless Management Information System. As the CoC's HMIS lead, HHSA is part of the CoC's data committee that meets regularly to review reports and works closely with the HMIS Administrator to implement training efforts to improve the quality of data input and data utilization.

(III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.

The CoC, Yolo County, and Yolo Housing maintain a collaborative working relationship regarding funding. Both the County and the local housing authority have a seat on the CoC board of directors and participate in monthly discussion and decision-making regarding funding. When the federal government provided 66 new emergency housing vouchers and case management funds to the housing authority, the numerous entities worked together in partnership to develop a coordinated system. The County has also partnered with local jurisdictions to utilize HHAP and other housing/homelessness funding to partner on permanent supportive housing projects that needed additional infrastructure or operating subsidy/service funding supports. In the past year, this has led to 145 new PSH units coming online with 18 more planned in early 2023.

(IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.

The recommended improvement to the poin-in-time report include:

- Ensure broad participation from the beginning by reaching out to key stakeholders in advance of the first meeting, with a focused effort on ensuring that all agencies who offer homeless service projects are included.
- If Community Lead organizational structure is the model for the next count, collect plans from Community Leads at least one month in advance of the count.
- Reduce and simplify questions to collect the most relevant and meaningful data
- Finalize and release survey at least one month in advance of the count.
- Apply for grants or other funding to provide count-specific financial support, iincluding money to incentivize participation.
- (V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youth-specific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

The CoC's Coordinated Entry Sub-committee has been researching ways to improve VI-SPADT or adopt a better tool that does not inadvertently perpetuate systemic disparities or favor certain demographic groups over others.

DATA CLARAFICATION: All data was obtained during the night of the Point-in-Time Count and Housing Inventory Count (2/22/22), there were 373 emergency shelter beds and 336 of those beds were occupied, leaving 37 available beds. Of the 512 who exited from ES, 109 exited to permanent housing. For this information we used data for calendar year 2021.

PLAN TO CONNECT RESIDENTS TO PERMANEMENT HOUSING: Many of the Emergency Shelter programs have case managers on staff to provide services to connect clients to permanent housing. These services include support in obtaining documents; assistance with application submission, transportation, financial assistance for security deposits, application fees and rent. Many case managers participate in the CoC's coordinated entry system and refer clients to housing when available.

Help drive progress toward achievement of the Outcome Goals and Goals for Underserved Populations and Populations Disproportionately Impacted by Homelessness (as identified in Part II above):

By allocating the largest portion of HHAP4 funds to prevention and diversion, we will reduce the number of single adults and families from first-time homelessness as well as reduce the average number of persons living homeless on a daily basis. These goals are consistent with the spirit and specifics of both HHAP3 and HHAP4. We are following the rationale suggested by the Regional Impact Council (RIC), an association of homeless program providers in the San Francisco Bay area that prioritizes preventative interventions.

Help address racial inequities and other inequities in the jurisdiction's homelessness response system:

Analysis of baseline data shows that Blacks and African Americans as well as Native Americans are overrepresented in the homeless population. Yolo County will direct service providers to focus outreach efforts to connect with those at highest risk of living unsheltered, including those with mental illness. We have begun to engage people with lived experience in their help in identifying strategies to reduce the number of individuals from disproportionally overrepresented groups in the homeless system

Be aligned with health and behavioral health care strategies and resources, including resources of local Medi-Cal managed care plans:

HHSA also has agreements/partnerships with our hospitals and the Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) located within our jurisdiction to fund a mobile medicine team that provides physical and behavioral health care. HHSA also directly provides or oversees all the contracted services for specialty mental health services to the SMI population and the Drug MediCal substance use disorder contractors

Support increased exits to permanent housing among people experiencing homelessness: We plan to use 20% of HHAP4 funding to increase exits to permanent housing by investing in new permanent housing that increases units available. This addresses our first strategic goal of expanding homeless crisis response and prevention services

DATA CLARAFICATION: All data was obtained during the night of the Point-in-Time Count and Housing Inventory Count (2/22/22). there were 373 emergency shelter beds and 336 of those beds were occupied, leaving 37 available beds. Of the 512 who exited from ES, 109 exited to permanent housing. For this information we used data for calendar year 2021.

PLAN TO CONNECT RESIDENTS TO PERMANEMENT HOUSING: Many of the Emergency Shelter programs have case managers on staff to provide services to connect clients to permanent housing. These services include support in obtaining documents; assistance with application submission, transportation, financial assistance for security deposits, application fees and rent. Many case managers participate in the CoC's coordinated entry system and refer clients to housing when available.
