Narratives

Disaster Damage:

The scope and severity of the damage from both the 2023 and 2024 severe winter storms is historically significant across the impacted counties across the state. The storms not only claimed lives but severely damaged several thousand structures, ranging from rural and agricultural areas to dense urban centers of California. This prompted dozens of disaster declarations and forced the evacuation and displacement of residents. All of these impacts further exacerbated the existing housing crisis in California. Communities impacted by the storms and subsequent flooding had near zero housing vacancies prior to disasters, limiting options for disaster survivors for either temporary or more long-term housing options. High housing costs resulted in rent-burdened households and many who live precariously close to homelessness. Given the profound destruction and disruption wrought by storms on the State of California, unmet needs in the state's Most Impacted and Distressed areas (MID) remain significant. HCD is committed to addressing these needs via pursuing additional resources and leveraging other resources to support the statewide recovery effort. In addition, HCD continues to coordinate closely with local, state, and federal partners to collect and analyze data, identify resources, and understand how jurisdictions' unmet needs evolve over time.

Recovery Needs:

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced that the State of California \$416,597,000 in funding to support long-term recovery efforts following the 2023 and 2024 Severe Winter Storms, Flooding, landslides and Mudslides (FEMA Disaster Numbers 4699, 4707, and 4758). The State of California will administer the funds through the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funding is designed to address needs that remain after all other assistance has been exhausted. This plan details how funds will be used to address remaining unmet need in the State of California. To meet disaster recovery needs, the statutes making CDBG-DR funds available have imposed requirements and authorized HUD to modify the rules that apply to the annual CDBG program to enhance flexibility and facilitate a quicker recovery. HUD has allocated \$416,597,000 in CDBG-DR funds to the State of California in response to FEMA DR: 4699, 4707, and 4758, through the publication of the Federal Register (FR6512-N-01). This allocation was made available through the Disaster Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2025 (Pub. L. 118-158). HCD is the lead and responsible agency for administering the CDBG-DR funds allocated to the State of California. HCD strives to ensure that every Californian has a safe, stable, and affordable home. However, California is in a housing crisis a half century in the making. After decades of underproduction, housing supply is far behind need leading to soaring housing prices and rents. Disaster exacerbates California's already unaffordable housing market. HCD intends to spend 100 Percent of the funds in Most Impacted Distressed areas identified for this allocation through housing, infrastructure and planning programs. Nearly 2/3 of disaster tieback funding is allocated to housing as the largest unmet recovery need for DRs 4699, 4707 and 4758. HCD's proposed housing, infrastructure and planning programs will help meet CDBG-DR's overall benefit requirement. The information provided in this action plan reflects a significant amount of outreach and engagement to all eligible counties, cities, and tribal governments, as well local nongovernmental organizations engaged in disaster response and recovery.

Administrative:

2023 and 2024 HCD Administrative FY2026 Quarter 1 reporting period draws were made for HCD Labor Costs and Indirect Costs that were incurred during FY 2025-26 Periods 5-7.

Infrastructure:

During Q1, HCD closed the application portal. 75 applications were received and reviewed for eligibility. HCD continued to hold weekly meetings with all eligible applicants. HCD also continued developing and refining program documents and resources.

Homebuyers Assistance Program:

The Disaster Recovery Homebuyer Assistance Program (DR-HBA) Projects are funded to assist with housing needs of low-to moderate income (LMI) households and eligibility is limited to residents of Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) California counties pursuant to the 2023-2024 Federal Disaster Declarations 4707, 4699 and 4758. The 23-24 HBA Program will provide down payment assistance to cover the funding gap between the amount of an applicant's first mortgage and the purchase price of a new home, enabling the eligible Applicants to relocate outside of a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) or High or Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone. The HBA program will allow applicants to identify and select properties which meets the U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) minimum property standard based on household size and work with first lender for financing options. Specifically, the Program provides down payment assistance of up to \$300,000 with some exception in high cost area to exceed the grant cap amount. The Program is launched on November 10, 2025 and the total local assistance is \$13,083,462.63.

Current status:

- 16 applications are in waitlist
- 4 applications are being reviewed for eligibility.
- 18 applicant is working with realtor partners and bidding on properties
- 10 applicant is under contract with sellers and will close within the next 30-60days.
- 6 closings as program launched in November 10, 2025

2023-2024 Insurance Resilience Planning Program (IRPP)

Program launched in Q1 and coordination for upcoming community and public engagement is underway.

2023-2024 MIT Planning (Tribal)

Program staff continue to develop program materials, including updating policies and procedures, Boilerplate for the contract, authorizing resolution, Unmet Needs Assessment template, and outreach materials. As materials are prepared, they are provided to the Hoopa Valley Tribe and Tule River Tribe for review.

As of January 2026, HCD began weekly working meetings with the Hoopa Valley Tribe and with Tule River Tribe. The meetings focus on discussing the program and documents necessary for tribal review. HCD provides ongoing technical assistance and guidance, including executing the contract, completing the unmet needs assessment, and identifying



programs/projects to address unmet needs.

HCD supports each tribe via ad hoc meetings, as needed. HCD accepted an invitation to attend a Hoopa Valley Tribe community engagement meeting via Zoom in March 2026. Hoopa Valley residents provided input on Hoopa Valley’s allocation of the CDBG-DR Tribal Program to help contribute to the Tribe’s Unmet Needs Assessment. Discussions were facilitated by the tribe and focused on urgent unmet needs for home repairs, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and community facilities needing improvement and resiliency for future disasters. The HCD team helped answer questions as they related to grant and program requirements. Next steps are for HCD to continue to support the tribe with identifying and analyzing data in development of the tribe’s unmet needs assessment, which will lead to determination of eligible activities needed for the CDBG-DR allocation. Separately, HCD is coordinating with the Tule River Tribe to schedule a full-day on-site visit in May 2026. This visit was requested by the tribe to facilitate a leadership-to-leadership meeting to foster partnership, discuss the upcoming program allocation opportunity, and conduct tours of disaster-impacted areas within the community. Program staff continues to work towards each tribe having an executed agreement with HCD in 2026.

2023-2024 RecoverCA-Single Family Rehabilitation and Reconstruction (SFRR)

The Single Family Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program (SFRR) is in the final stages of design and implementation. The program is expected to launch Q2 2026.

2023 - 2024 Multifamily Housing Program:

The NOFA was released in September and closed in mid-November. A total of 19 applications were submitted across all geographic regions. Staff have completed the review of all 19 applications, and four projects have been selected for award on March 26, 2026.

The program provides \$136,625,873 million dollars to support shovel-ready multifamily new construction projects. All proposed projects must be located within DR-4699 or DR-4758 Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) areas as designated by HUD. The MID counties for these disaster declarations include Monterey, San Benito, San Diego, Santa Cruz, Tulare, and Tuolumne.

The Program awarded four applications to build in the counties of Santa Cruz County (150 Felker Street and 7th & Brommer), Monterey County (Madison Street Apartments), and San Diego County (E Street Apartments) on March 26, 2026. 150 Felker Street received a full award of \$31.7 million. 7th & Brommer received a full award of \$46.6 million. Madison Street Apartments received a full award of \$30.6 million. E Street Apartments received a full award of \$27.5 million.

The four new construction projects will create 261 new affordable rental units for households earning between 30% and 80% percent of AMI.

All four projects will serve special needs populations, including chronically homeless individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Each project is expected to close on construction financing by Q3 2026.

Activity Description:

Housing and Community Development (HCD) will provide direct awards to eligible HUD-identified MID applicants using an allocation methodology based on unmet need as established by the unmet needs assessment. Through extensive outreach, HCD gathered project level infrastructure data from the DR 4699, DR 4758, and DR 4707 MIDs. The data was assessed for tie-back to the qualifying disasters and then relevant data was totaled and applied proportionally to the overall MID infrastructure unmet need. This proportion of unmet need was then applied to the total infrastructure program award to determine allocations. Upon action plan approval of these direct allocations, applicants will be able to submit eligible projects towards their allocations until all funds are obligated. HCD will review projects for the use of funds and provide technical assistance and oversight to ensure that local governments receiving funds execute their infrastructure recovery effectively.

Activity Description:

The primary objective of Single Family Rehabilitation and Reconstruction (SFRR) is the provision of housing in the areas impacted by the DR-4707, DR-4699, and DR-4758 disasters. SFRR is designed to ensure that the housing needs of LMI households, including individuals that were made homeless as a result of the disaster, are addressed to the greatest extent feasible. The program will ensure all homes rehabilitated or reconstructed through SFRR meet resiliency standards to mitigate against future disaster impacts. Rehabilitation or reconstruction assistance will be provided to eligible applicants based on the extent of damage to their primary residences or single-family rental properties. Assistance may be in the form of program provided construction management of rehabilitation and reconstruction activities. SFRR may reimburse program approved eligible activities incurred by owner-occupied applicants.

Activity Description:

This program provides local jurisdictions with an expansive and hands-on role in driving local community infrastructure and planning needs that meet the definition of mitigation. The Resilient Infrastructure and Planning Program (MIT-RIPP) will assist local jurisdictions in addressing mitigation-related infrastructure and planning needs to support risk reduction from the three primary hazards (wildfire, flooding, and earthquake) as established within the Mitigation Needs Assessment. Projects may address risks to a variety of systems and structures to enable continuous operations of critical business and government functions during future disasters and improve responses for human health and safety or economic security. Housing and Community Development (HCD) anticipates that the program design will present projects that could overlap across different environments, enabling HCD to determine maximum impact within the MID and surrounding areas.

Activity Description:

Planning efforts at the local, regional and state level are necessary to ensure the disaster impacted areas are rebuilt in a more resilient manner and can prepare for differences in funding cycles required to construct housing or infrastructure projects. In response to the impacts of the 2023 severe storms, the Hoopa Valley Tribe were declared a major disaster area by Congress. A major disaster declaration is indicative of disaster impacts exceeding local capacity to respond. HCD was able to identify some anecdotal information of continued recovery needs for Hoopa Valley tribe. When HCD contacted tribal leadership, they indicated need for additional time to gather data to formulate the full picture of Hoopa Valley tribe's disaster recovery needs. In addition, to Hoopa Valley tribe's impacts from March 2023 storms (DR 4707), HCD was able to gather information on DR 4699 disaster impacts from the Tule River Tribe, a federal recognized tribe located in Tulare County.

Activity Progress Narrative:

Program staff continue to develop program materials, including updating policies and procedures, Boilerplate for the contract, authorizing resolution, Unmet Needs Assessment template, and outreach materials. As materials are prepared, they are provided to the Hoopa Valley Tribe and Tule River Tribe for review. As of January 2026, HCD began weekly working meetings with the Hoopa Valley Tribe and with Tule River Tribe. The meetings focus on discussing the program and documents necessary for tribal review. HCD provides ongoing technical assistance and guidance, including executing the contract, completing the unmet needs assessment, and identifying programs/projects to address unmet needs.



HCD supports each tribe via ad hoc meetings, as needed. HCD accepted an invitation to attend a Hoopa Valley Tribe community engagement meeting via Zoom in March 2026. Hoopa Valley residents provided input on Hoopa Valley's allocation of the CDBG-DR Tribal Program to help contribute to the Tribe's Unmet Needs Assessment. Discussions were facilitated by the tribe and focused on urgent unmet needs for home repairs, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and community facilities needing improvement and resiliency for future disasters. The HCD team helped answer questions as they related to grant and program requirements. Next steps are for HCD to continue to support the tribe with identifying and analyzing data in development of the tribe's unmet needs assessment, which will lead to determination of eligible activities needed for the CDBG-DR allocation. Separately, HCD is coordinating with the Tule River Tribe to schedule a full-day on-site visit in May 2026. This visit was requested by the tribe to facilitate a leadership-to-leadership meeting to foster partnership, discuss the upcoming program allocation opportunity, and conduct tours of disaster-impacted areas within the community. Program staff continues to work towards each tribe having an executed agreement with HCD in 2026.
