CDBG - Success Story

Seeley Colonia, County of Imperial Fire Station and Cooling Center











The County of Imperial leveraged Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to construct a dual-purpose fire station and cooling center in Seeley, a designated colonia community. This 4,375 square foot facility houses the Imperial County Fire Department, featuring accommodations such as bays for two fire trucks, sleeping quarters, bathrooms, a kitchen, and other essential amenities. Additionally, the facility contains a 975 square foot cooling center and restroom designed to provide a safe refuge for residents during periods of severe heat. Summer temperatures frequently reach between 110-120 degrees in Imperial County, putting low to moderate income (LMI) residents at risk, many of whom cannot afford to maintain or replace HVAC systems. The cooling center, with capacity to shelter up to 56 people, will serve as a critical resource during extreme heat events, power outages, and natural disasters, ensuring the safety and wellbeing of vulnerable community members.

Program Highlights Community Development Block **Grant CARES Act** (CDBG-CV)



CDBG-CV Program Highlights

- Since launch, CDBG-CV has assisted over 237,000 California residents.
- ▶ In FY2024, CDBG-CV realized the following accomplishments:
 - Assisted more than 155,000 individuals through public services
 - Supported 50 economic development programs across the state
 - Continued development of 32 permanent housing multi-family developments
 - Created or improved access for more than 81,000 individuals to public facilities across the state
- In FY2024, CBDG-CV grantees expended \$35.5 million on eligible activities, planning and administration.



CDBG-CV Program Highlights

- City of Exeter Business Assistance Program
 - Assisted 5 small businesses impacted by COVID 19 to retain and create jobs through forgivable loans
- County of Tulare Homekey Rehabilitation
 - Converted a former motel into 22 permanent housing units for persons experiencing homelessness
- City of Arvin Homeless Navigation Center
 - Provided comprehensive supportive services for over 100 individuals experiencing homelessness
- City of Dunsmuir Subsistence Payment Program
 - Provided emergency rent, mortgage, and utility assistance to 374 households

ESG-CV Program Highlights

- ➤ 49 Subrecipients, including 7 Tribal Communities, had executed contracts to utilize ESG-CV funds to prepare for, prevent and respond to COVID-19.
- > HCD worked with ICF Consultants to provide training, technical assistance and support to subrecipients throughout the grant period.
- ➤ California expended the entire \$319.5 ESG-CV grant (100 percent).

ESG-CV Program Community Highlight Riverside County

- Riverside County's 2025 Point in Time County (PIT) revealed a 19-percent reduction in unsheltered homelessness.
- ESG-CV funds allowed Riverside to create flexible, scalable interventions that met people where they were on the streets, in shelters and exiting institutions.
- ➤ The County's ESG-CV funded programs assisted 1413 individuals transition into permanent housing a critical marker of long-term stability. An additional 538 people were connected to temporary housing placements, bridging the gap to permanent options.
- The County's ESG-CV grant enabled them to provide critical services to 5,435 individuals experiencing homelessness through a comprehensive, coordinated system of care

Program Highlights HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)



HOME - Program Highlights

- Released a HOME NOFA in December 2024 for approximately \$35 million, which included the 2024 HUD HOME allocation, a 50% Rural Areas funding target, and a 20% funding target for Native American Entities.
- The NOFA was over-subscribed for Project Activities by \$55 million but undersubscribed for Program Activities by \$8.5 million. Pending approval, the NOFA will be amended to extend the application due date for Program Activities and Native American Entity (NAE) Project Activities on an over-the-counter basis. Awards for Program Activities and NAE Project Activities will be made on a rolling basis, and awards for non-NAE Project Activities will be made in December 2025.
- The State HOME Program greatly exceeded its \$1.13 million matching funds obligation, by more than \$28 million.
- Total HOME Expenditures of \$32,318,481 include grant and Program Income expenditures made during the year for both open and completed activities, as well as administration.



HOPWA - Program Highlights

- The Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) Program funds housing assistance and supportive services designed to reduce or prevent homelessness for low-income persons living with HIV (PLWH).
- During FY 2024-25, HOPWA served:
 - > 632 households with housing assistance (rent, mortgage, utility, move-in, shelter, facility operating costs)
 - > 775 households with supportive services (food, transportation, case management)
 - > 259 households with housing location and information assistance
