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California COVID-19 Rent Relief Program Monthly Report to Joint Legislative Budget Committee – November 2021

Highlights and Milestones

Through November, the California COVID-19 Rent Relief program continued to observe strong demand for rental and utility assistance from residents and landlords across the state. Ongoing demand has necessitated a continued focus on deploying available resources to households based on established prioritizations provided under federal law, including factors such as income, unemployment, and risk of eviction. The high volume of applications has prompted many state and local grantees to submit formal requests for additional federal funds in November, as authorized by the United States Department of the Treasury (Treasury). Pursuant to Treasury guidance, the state-administered program is participating in the formal reallocation process for ERA1¹ and ERA2² funds.³ As the state program continues to deploy remaining ERA2 resources and anticipates additional federal resources, the program is continuing to accept applications, and prioritizing assistance to households most in need.

The state-administered program has expended over \$1.44 billion through November 30 to assist over 124,400 households across the state. In November alone, the state-administered program delivered more than \$445.8 million in rent and utility payments.

In addition to the strong performance of the state-administered program, locally administered programs have cumulatively obligated more than \$630.8 million and paid out approximately \$341 million of state block grant funds assisting more than 45,000 households with rent and utilities through November 30.

The coordinated efforts of state and local emergency rental assistance programs continue to serve the needs of residents statewide by keeping families housed, preventing evictions, and stabilizing housing providers as California advances from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Key achievements

The volume of new applications in November continued to demonstrate substantial need for emergency rental assistance as the state Rent Relief program received more than 75,000 total applications (approximately 47,000 tenant and 28,000 landlord). Similar to trends seen in October, the pace of applications eased up slightly in November. Despite the slight

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reduction, nearly 69 percent of total applications to the program were received in the last three months (see the table on page 3 for additional application metrics).

As of the end of November, the state-administered program was approving for payment more than 8,000 applications per week on average, with payments totaling more than \$89 million each week. Cumulatively, the state-administered program has expended a total of \$1.44 billion through November 30 in rental and utility assistance. Of the total, approximately \$1.21 billion or 83.9 percent of funds expended provided benefits to those at or below 50 percent of the area median income.

Similar to the demand observed by the state-administered program, several locally administered programs in California have also fully obligated and expended ERA1 funds and are steadily obligating ERA2 funds. For example, as of November 30, nine Option B jurisdictions reported obligations in excess of their ERA1 state block grant allocations. The Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) disbursed ERA2 block grants to many of these localities and is working rapidly to distribute funds to the areas of greatest demand. The local programs are shown with their respective performance in the section "Locally Administered Programs - Option B Jurisdictions – ERA1 Funds" beginning on page 11.

Continued Eviction Protections

The eviction protections established by Chapter 27, Statutes of 2021 (AB 832) require both the state's Rent Relief program and locally administered programs to provide mechanisms by which landlords, tenants, legal representatives, and the courts may do both of the following:

- Verify the status of an application for rental assistance based upon the property address and a unique application number.
- Obtain copies of any determination relative to an application for rental assistance (i.e., name, address, and if the application has been approved, denied, or is pending).

California's Rent Relief program is complying with these requirements and provides information regarding application status via the Call Center and an online option. During November there were more than 2,500 requests for application documentation and application status, with requests on average being resolved by the following day.

The Housing Is Key website provides information for landlords, tenants, and community organizations on the eviction protections under AB 832, including template letters for tenants to declare financial distress, tips on what to do if given notice of eviction, and links to legal aid resources.

Beginning in November, email notifications were sent to all applicants who indicated on their application that they would like to be referred to a legal aid organization. The notification provides a link to help find local legal aid support. HCD will continue to notify applicants if they request information and will share contact information of applicants with legal aid organizations if the applicant allows.

Fund Recapture and Reallocation

Treasury allocated approximately \$2.6 billion to the State of California in two rounds of ERA funding for the state program to support jurisdictions partnering with the state. Another \$2.6 billion was awarded to 49 local jurisdictions across the state, meaning that the state, as a whole, received approximately \$5.2 billion. Of the total, the state-administered program is responsible for approximately \$2.53 billion. Currently, the state program serves 55 large and small localities (30 non-direct allocated counties and 25 direct allocated cities and counties partnering with the state) representing roughly 64 percent of the state's population. By the end of November, two localities in California had voluntarily requested that Treasury reallocate their remaining share of federal ERA1 funds to the state-administered program.

Based on statutory funding obligation deadlines and Treasury's public statements, it is clear that funds are available to be reallocated to ERA programs that continue to have high demand for assistance, such as the California state program and corresponding local programs. In response to an invitation from Treasury, HCD submitted a formal request for additional funds to be reallocated to California as Treasury recaptures unused ERA funds from other grantees. Treasury stated its process will start by reallocating available ERA1 funds and will transition to ERA2 in accordance with federal statutory timelines. HCD will submit subsequent requests for additional rounds of federal reallocations, inclusive of unused ERA1 and ERA2 funds. The state's Rent Relief program will remain open and process applications in alignment with available funds.

In addition to seeking additional ERA1 funds from Treasury, HCD retains its discretion to recapture and reallocate state block grant funds in alignment with the performance and operational deadlines described in state and federal guidance. During November, HCD did not recapture any state block grant funds previously disbursed.

Customer Support

During the month of November, over 75,000 new tenant and landlord applications were submitted, totaling more than 547,000 applications submitted since the inception of the program. November's application volume reflects sustained demand for rental assistance; however, the volume of applications increased at a slower rate than in previous months, as shown in the table below.

The Call Center received over 549,000 calls in October for a total of 2,436,241 calls since the program's inception. As reflected on the schedule below, HCD increased Call Center/Case Management staff levels through September to handle the anticipated increases in call volume and application intake. The October and November metrics, as expected, show a modest decrease in staffing levels which aligns with the slowing growth rate for call volume

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and the pace of applications (reflected above). The November metrics underscore continued attention to processing approved applications and obligating funds.

Outreach

Public Relations and Communications

Considering the cumulative volume of applications to the state-administered Rent Relief program and continued strong application flow in both October and November, HCD paused large-scale outreach activities and media buys during the latter part of October. This strategy was continued through the month of November.

Local Partner Network Community Support

The community-based Local Partner Network (LPN) maintains 143 confirmed partners statewide serving those areas with highest eviction risk. The following LPN outreach metrics reflect sustained activity during November:

- Over 14,500 appointments in November, totaling 41,975 since inception. This represents an 18 percent increase over last month.
- 15,220 inbound Appointment Center calls in November totaling 114,400 since inception. This represents a 17.4 percent decrease since last month. The average handle time for calls is almost 10 minutes in English, and just over 10 minutes in other languages. Assistance is available in 14 languages.
- 3,990 attendees participated in 127 webinars in November.
- 9,124 phone or Zoom appointments hosted by LPN partners to support applicants, with 27,852 since inception.
- 4,994 in-person appointments by LPN partners to support applicants, with 16,198 since inception.
